Fair Week for Field Work: Pennsylvania had an average of 3.5 days suitable for field work last week. Temperatures for the state were reported an average of 62(°F), with a high of 92(°F) and a low of 33(°F). Things cooled down a bit last week and some desperately needed rains paid a visit state wide. While a welcome boon to most, there were reports of poor drainage and crop flooding from Erie, Juniata and Snyder counties. In Lancaster county, heavy rains eroded soil in freshly worked fields. Recent cuttings of hay, now wet, are expected to suffer some quality. Apples and peaches continue to be thinned with apple quality appearing particularly promising. When weather allowed, field activities included spraying, planting corn and soybeans as well as cutting hay and haylage.

#### **ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney**

Adams County had a wet week this week with very little field work done. Various amounts of rainfall throughout the county. Sun/Mon York Springs received 1 1/4 inches from two thunderstorms and some hail, Monday night into Tuesday morning York Springs received 2 inches and 70 degrees, Tuesday 50 morning temperatures with drizzle and cloudy and got into 60's, Wednesday morning 57 degrees and cloudy 0.5" and into the 60's, Thursday cloudy/drizzle in the 60's. Friday morning 57 and cloudy till lunchtime and the sun finally came out for the first time all week. Corn and soybeans previously planted are emerging with the rainfall we received this week however there are fields that have standing water in them also. Soil needs to dry out before any more corn and soybeans can be planted. No hay was made this week as conditions did not permit. Wheat and barley are looking pretty good for the most part. Some hay and pasture hay was lodged due to heavy rainfall. Fruit crops continue to grow. The thunderstorms past week have had some areas that had hail and damaged the fruit but is sporadic as to location. Producers are concerned with the rain we have been receiving as this does not help to control diseases such as Scab, Fire Blight etc. Producers are carefully watching weather conditions and their fruit crops. Strawberries are being harvested in the county. The rain affected some of the berries. Other vegetables are being harvested in the county also. Overall the producers are grateful for the rainfall but are concerned where water is standing and the need of some heat and sunshine to help all of the crops. Producers are reminded to report their spring planted small grains and spring seeded forage crops before the June 15th Farm Service Agency deadline.

#### **ADAMS County, Thomas Kerr**

Rain finally ...1.5 inches and then cloudy days. After 6 weeks of less than an inch and watching storms go around, this was a "Million Dollar" rain.

#### **ADAMS County, Lee Showalter**

Hand thinning of peaches continues where needed. Chemical thinning of apples is basically complete with generally good results. Apples appear to have a good crop and the fruit is growing rapidly.

#### **ALLEGHENY/BEAVER/BUTLER** Counties, Luke Fritz

Hay making and herbicide applications are being completed. Most of the area received between 1 and 2 in of rain.

#### **CAMBRIA** County, Dolly Little

Harvesting Haylage and Dry Hay. Continuing with planting of corn and soybeans. Topdressing fields.

#### **CENTRE** County, Dick A Decker

Week of light showers. Field work continued when conditions allowed. 1 inch rainfall in my gauge for the week.

#### **ERIE** County, Nancy Lewis

Heavy downpours affected newly planted fields of corn, oats and soybeans causing water to pool. Winter damage due to below normal temperatures and May frost affected peach and cherry crops.

#### JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William Sheaffer

Heavy rains again this week has limited the field activities. The crops on the poorly drained areas are showing signs of too much water. Hay making is behind schedule and decreasing in quality. Spraying and a limited amount of haylage making were accomplished.

#### LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

The county received anywhere from 2 inches to over 5 inches of rain. Some heavy causing erosion, especially in freshly worked soil. Rain was a real blessing for all crops especially tobacco. Expect second cutting of alfalfa in about 1 week. This coming week will see a lot of side dressing of corn and some post spraying of weedy corn and soybean fields.

#### **LEBANON County, Charlene Ziegler**

Much needed rain came in large amounts. Many areas of the county saw up to 3 inches. Hail was reported near Annville. Grass hay cutting was put on hold early in the week but resumed by the end of the week.

#### **MERCER** County, Jim Rust

Rain and thunder storms are moving in from the west as I report this Monday morning. Crops are in need of rain. Strawberries started to be sold late last week in our area. Standing hay is past its prime.

#### **MONTGOMERY** County, Andrew Frankenfield

A good soaking rain for a few days early in the week followed by cloudy weather prevented field work for most of the week. By late in the week some spraying and side dressing of corn and planting resumed. Unsettled weather has prevented much if any dry hay from being made.

#### **POTTER County, Nicole L. Santangelo**

Timely rain storms have kept us from drought... and caused a lot of hay to be bailed wet, or suffer quality as a result of rain. Overall conditions are relatively dry still.

#### WESTMORELAND County, Thomas Sierzega

Cool weather early week, hot weather late week. Corn and beans progressing. Could use some rain. Hay making in progress.
