Good Week for Field Work: Pennsylvania had an average of 5 days suitable for field work last week. Temperatures for the state were reported an average of 73(°F), with a high of 95(°F) and a low of 40(°F). Weather varied across the state, with some areas receiving large amounts of rainfall. Farmers spent time catching up on field work which was delayed due to wet weather. Both wrapped and dry hay making continued throughout the week. Aside from few reports of hail damage fruit crops continue to display bountiful progress. With corn and soybean planting almost complete, farmers focused on post spraying and side dressing.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started the week 64 degrees and cloudy with very little sun. Thunderstorms with wind on Monday evening that caused some trees and buildings in the Littlestown area to come down and have damage to properties. York Springs had 1/2 inch of rainfall. Tuesday was 67 and cloudy with some showers early and daytime into the 80's. Wednesday was 59 and sunny blue sky and warmed to 84 degrees. Thursday was 72 morning temperature and hazy and hot and humid and daytime got to 94 degrees. Today started out 73 degrees and morning sunny but a little hazy. Temperatures today are to get into mid 90's and humid with chance of thunderstorms later today. Corn and soybeans continue to be planted this week where field conditions permitted. Most corn has been planted now since RMA final plant date of 6/10 has past. Soybeans continue to be planted after cover crop or forage crops harvested. Hay continues to be made some wrapped and some for dry hay. Haymaking is behind compared to other years. Barley and rye are ripening and changed colors and wheat is getting ready to start changing colors here next week. Fruit crops continue to grow. Some producers are watching to see what happens with the fruit that got hit by hail the last few weeks. The extent still isn't known from hail damage. Growers are concerned about other diseases since we had rainy start to June which affect the fruit crops. Vegetables are being harvested and strawberries are about finished in the county. Overall the producers are busy trying to do several jobs at one time since the spring weather has caused seasons to cross. Crops are looking pretty decent for now. Producers are reminded to visit their FSA offices to report their crops for harvest in 2015 by the respective deadlines.

ADAMS County, Thomas Kerr

Hot humid week with few showers. Good for corn and beans. Some hay chopped. Early reports of barley harvest were disappointing with yields only 60% of normal due to dry weather in May. Some concerns for wheat in the western part of the county as well. Short heads and shriveled kernels.

ADAMS County, Lee Showalter

Recent rain showers have improved soil moisture conditions.

CAMBRIA County, Dolly Little

Heavy Winds and Rain Friday evening and scattered showers Sunday morning and evening. Crops were in need of rain at the beginning of the week but that changed by the end of the week. The rains were spotty at times but throughout the weekend it appeared most of the county received rain.

CENTRE County, Dick A Decker

Week of showers, 1.5 inches of rainfall in my gauge. Dry hay making has been difficult. Corn is growing nicely.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Great week for field work. Farmers catching up on work which was delayed due to wet weather. Corn and beans look good with uniform fields and good weed control in general. Tobacco plating is about finished with second cutting alfalfa starting next week.

MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield

We are back into a rainy pattern again with a chance of storms every other day. The heat and moisture has helped everything grow quickly. Crops look much better than a few weeks ago. Hay making has been very challenging the past couple weeks, some made good dry hay by the weekend, but others choose not to cut because of wet soil conditions and the chance of rain. Still a lot of 1st cutting grass hay to be made and the weather still doesn't look favorable. Corn and soybean planting is mostly done, post spraying and side dressing have been occurring. Pumpkins were planted this week on many farms.

WESTMORELAND County, Thomas Sierzega

Much needed rain this past week. Combination of rain and hot weather has the corn and soybeans taking off.
