**Fair Week for Field Work:** Pennsylvania had an average of 3.0 days suitable for field work last week. The calculated average temperature for the state last week was 67(°F), with a high of 86(°F) and a low of 43(°F). Rain continues to impede maturation of field crops and cause quality loss to bailed hay. Despite some stunted corn and yellowed soybeans, field crop health remains relatively good despite the weather. Corn can be seen beginning to tassel and some soybeans have begun to flower. Apples and peaches also display good health but some cherries have suffered due to rainy weather. Field activities, when weather allowed, were limited to harvesting, spraying and raking mulch hay.

#### ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County continues to be very wet. Monday started out with temperatures 57 degrees and sunny blue sky then into the 70's. Tuesday down pour in Upper Adams area with over a 1.5 inch in an hour and other areas had some rain but not as much. Wednesday early morning thunderstorms but not much accumulation. Thursday was pretty nice weather. Friday was sunny and in the 80's but Saturday started raining morning and continued all day. Half inch of rain at the least. Sunday was foggy till mid-morning then clouds lifted and sun came out and hot and humid in the 80's. Today is raining and cloudy. Corn and soybeans continue to struggle because of too much moisture and some areas of fields are pretty yellow from sitting in water so long. Some corn on higher ground looks pretty good and some starting to tassel. Soybeans are doing ok but again some yellow from too much moisture. Producers are still trying to harvest barley and wheat as field conditions are pretty poor because of rains. Feed wheat is being taken into the mills. Some producers trying to dry before taking to the mills. Producers are also trying to bale hay when they can but the quality is not very good. Most hay is old by the time they are getting it baled. Fruit crops are looking pretty good. Cherry harvest started last week but the rainy weather isn't helping the quality of the cherries that survived the spring weather where not damaged by hail. Producers are on alert by Extension about insects and diseases which are affecting their fruit crops. Vegetables are looking pretty good and being harvested to be enjoyed by all. Sweet corn, zucchini etc. are available. Overall the producers are keeping busy but wondering when the rainy conditions will subside enough to allow them to get some crops harvested. All of them in the same boat being behind in all areas.

#### **ADAMS County, Thomas Kerr**

Wet week. All crops are doing as good as can be expected and looking good at this time in Franklin county. Need drying weather to finish wheat harvest and double crop corn and bean planting. Tart cherry and sweet corn harvest under way.

#### **ADAMS County, Lee Showalter**

Fruit continues to size well with growers actively hand thinning apples.

#### **CAMBRIA** County, Dolly Little

Continuing rain has not allowed the hay to get harvested. Hay is getting old and stemmy. Not much field work can be done with rain just about every day.

#### **CENTRE** County, Dick A Decker

Farming activities continue between showers. Crops look good, but hay making is difficult. I had 2.8 inches of rainfall for the week.

#### JUNIATA/SNYDER County, William C. Sheaffer

Limited field activities due to the saturated soil conditions. Wheat harvest has begun with the yields being above average, and the barley harvest is complete. Oats is turning color and is looking good. Impossible to make dry hay. Activities for the week were harvesting, spraying and raking mulch hay.

#### LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Corn has started tasselling, soybeans are bushing out and flowering. Excessive rainfall is causing various diseases to pop up. This is true especially on the tobacco crop. Blue mold & angular leaf spot are particularly present.

#### **LEBANON County, Charlene Ziegler**

Rain plus humidity equals happy corn. Corn is beginning to tassel and silk. Soybeans are beginning to flower. The weather this week allowed small windows to cut and bale grass hay. Unfortunately some fields have deep ruts from the equipment.

#### **MERCER** County, Jim Rust

Our area was able to bale some hay on Friday of the past week. Many corn and soybean fields still dry days to side dress and spray for weeds. The hay quality is very poor for the first cutting.

#### **MONTGOMERY** County, Andrew Frankenfield

Rain showers every couple days continue to challenge haymaking. Earliest field corn is just about ready to tassel and is looking very good. Some areas that received more rain have yellow areas in fields where soils were saturated too long. Wheat is ready but getting good weather to harvest it is a problem.

#### **UNION County, James C. Brubaker**

Some beans and corn beginning to show yellowing from too much moisture. Had almost 3" just this month.

#### YORK County, Jon Rowehl

Earlier planted corn is coming out in tassel. Soybeans have started to flower. Weather conditions are hampering wheat and hay harvest.
