Excellent Week for Field Work: Pennsylvania had an average of 6.5 days suitable for field work last week. Reported temperatures for Pennsylvania last week clocked in with a high of 91(°F) and a low of 43(°F). Fields were abuzz with activity as sunny and dry weather prevailed throughout the state nearly all week. While weather has been ideal for fieldwork some areas could use a good rain to renew diminished topsoil moisture. Some corn and soybeans have also begun to show signs of heat stress. Field activities for the week included grain harvesting, haymaking, spraying, sowing cover crops, and clipping pastures.

ADAMS County, Judy Behney

Adams County has had nice weather all week. Beginning of week morning temperatures were still in 70's with daytime high 80's and sunny. Tuesday morning early 4 am southern Adams around State/County line had some hail, heavy winds and some rain and the rest of county had about 1/4 inch of rainfall. Wednesday thru Friday morning temperatures 60's and high 70's daytime. Thursday as day went on cloudier and some light rainfall to dampen the ground early evening but no accumulation. Today started out cloudy and nice morning temperature. We are kind of dry and could use a little rainfall to help the crops continue to mature. Corn and soybeans are looking fairly decent but corn still has different stages within the same field across the county. Hay continues to be made when weather permitting. Some dry hay and some wet hay and then wrapped. Oats is about ready to harvest. Some soil preparation has begun so producers can do new seedings and also to get ready for small grain to be planted in September. Fruit crops are looking pretty decent. Early apples are being harvested. Peaches are into being harvested and readily available to be enjoyed by all. Vegetables continue to be harvested and doing well. Overall the producers are keeping busy with fieldwork. They are hoping their crops have decent yields but time will tell on most of them yet.

ADAMS County, Lee Showalter

Fresh apple harvest will start this week beginning with Gingergolds. Apples continue to size well. Peach harvest has moved into a slightly less intense pressure as variety development has slowed. Size, color, and flavor attributes are excellent. The fruit area could use some moisture.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Excellent week to get hay made. Corn silage harvest has begun with short season varieties. Looks like there will be a generous supply of silage leaving plenty of dry corn available in the county.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Good field work conditions. We could use some showers for top soil moisture.

COLUMBIA County, John O Yocum

Need rain-crops still recovering at night, but more showing wilting during the day.

JUNIATA/SNYDER County, William C. Sheaffer

The crops could use a good soaking rain; corn and soybeans on the lighter soils is suffering severely and the alfalfa is going to be very short for the third and fourth cuttings. Main activities for the week were grain harvesting, haymaking, spraying, sowing cover crops, and clipping pastures

LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Corn is a little shorter than average given wet conditions, but majority of corn is in tassel and starting to grow ears. With some rain in the forecast, it should give the corn the boost it needs to finish out strong.

LEBANON County, Charlene Ziegler

A week with little or no rain and high temperatures caused the corn to show some signs of stress. Some hay fields appear brown. Alfalfa and hay was mowed.

MERCER County, Jim Rust

Our local weather station at the Youngstown (Ohio) Airport is reporting only 0.07 inches of rainfall since July 20, 2015. We have had only two days of 90 degrees plus for the entire summer. It is extremely dry and the area crops are showing the signs of stress. The past week was busy with hay harvesting - some second and some third cutting - below average yields of hay. Our area received are first shipment of peaches from southeastern PA since Mercer County has very few peach trees.
