Excellent Week for Field Work: Pennsylvania had an average of 6.5 days suitable for field work last week. Reported temperatures for Pennsylvania include an average state average of 70(°F), a high of 93(°F) and a low of 65(°F). While ideal for fieldwork, perpetual hot and dry weather has caused moisture stress and reduced crop condition in many areas. Several reports sited dry and wilted corn and soybeans with stunted growth. Ironically, many potatoes were reported to have suffered rot due to wet fields in the Southwestern portion of the state. Field activities for the week included grain haymaking, sowing cover crops and preparing for fall plantings.

ADAMS County, Judy Behney

Adams County had a nice week of weather. Monday morning temperature was 73 and cloudy and rose to 80's. Tuesday was 73 and cloudy and some areas got 0.2" early morning rain then by mid-morning sunny 80's then at lunchtime some areas of the county received rain then the sun came out afternoon. Wednesday started in the 60's and 80's daytime and some areas of county around 8 pm received some rainfall but most did not get any. Thursday started 64 morning and clear sky into the 80s. Friday morning was 60 degrees and sunny. We are pretty dry considering how wet we were in June. All crops could use some moisture. Corn and soybeans continue to grow. Corn is starting to show signs of lack of rainfall and drying at bottom. Crop Insurance adjusters are starting to request information so they can appraise the corn that will be harvested for silage. Late soybeans are just sitting there without much growth and unless we get moisture will not make too many soybeans. Hay continues to be made when conditions permit. Land preparation for new hay seedings is happening around the county. Fruit crops continue to mature. Sizing of apples are looking for a pretty good crop. Peaches continue to be harvested with freestone varieties being harvested now. Nice flavor and size this year of peaches. Fruitgrowers with the help of PSU Extension information are still controlling insects that are affecting their crops. Vegetables are very good this year and plentiful. Overall the crops are looking pretty decent for the year we have had of weather but we could use some additional moisture to help the crops continue to do well.

ADAMS County, Lee Showalter

Gingergold apple harvest will conclude this week. Peaches continue to be harvested on an earlier than normal schedule. The apples continue to size well. Moisture is now short for most growers.

ADAMS County, Thomas Kerr

Dry. No showers this week. Fruit harvest is progressing well. Quality and flavor is excellent. Need rain to help pastures and hay. Corn drying down and silage harvest has begun.

BEDFORD County, Robin J. Robertson

Crop conditions are deteriorating with the hot dry weather.

CAMBRIA County, Dolly Little

Harvesting oats and hay. Started harvesting potatoes being sold directly from field. Many of the potatoes are rotten in fields that lay wet.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Most of the week was good for field work. Total rain fall in my gauge for the week was 2.2 inches.

COLUMBIA County, John O Yocum

Received 0.75" of rain, but with the lower humidity, wind and size of crops within a couple of days wilting during the day returned-need more rain. Corn dough was underestimated last week "sorry".

JUNIATA/SNYDER County, William C. Sheaffer

The continued heat and lack of rainfall is putting a hurt on the corn and soybeans. Very good quality dry hay has been made this week with the yield being reduced due to the weather. Main activities for the week were haymaking, sowing cover crops and making preparations for fall planting.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Hot dry weather continues across the county. Silage harvest will begin this week, especially in drought prone fields. Lots of firing on lower corn leaves on ridge fields and shallower soils. Beans filling out nicely, however upper pods are aborting in the most droughty fields. Tobacco harvest is in full swing, with average quality due to leaf diseases.

MERCER County, Jim Rust

Sweet corn producer's late plantings are being stunted by the lack of rainfall. Hay producers are reporting lower yields due to the lack of rainfall. The area fairs have started this week. The area has seen an increase in timber harvesting for Mercer County this summer.

YORK County, John Rowehl

Moisture stress continues with another week without serious precipitation, exacerbated by some of the highest temperatures of the season.
