Excellent Week for Field Work: Pennsylvania had an average of 6.5 days suitable for field work last week. Reported temperatures for Pennsylvania include a state average of 65(°F), a high of 82(°F) and a low of 32(°F). Dry and hot days leading to high quality Hay. Corn grain harvests continue showing the ill effect the lack of rain has had with varying fair to low yields. There were some rain showers. According to some producer corn and soybeans are drying down really fast. According to our reporters there has been shortages of harvest labor. The majority of field activities involved harvesting of apples, corn, vegetables, soybeans, corn for grain and silage, manure spreading and planting winter and cover crops.

#### **ADAMS County, Judy Behney**

Adams County had another nice week of weather. Most mornings were in the 50's and daytime into the higher 70's and sunny. Tuesday evening we got some rain showers but no accumulation. Corn silage continues to be harvested with some yielding good tonnage and others with not many ears. All depends on when the corn was planted and where in the county. Corn and soybeans continue to be harvested for grain. Some producers are saying that corn and soybeans are drying down quicker than they thought when they were checking moisture they were surprised. Early soybeans either have lost their leaves or are colored and ready to lose their leaves. Late soybeans are still green and producers are hoping to buy some more days of nice weather to take them to maturity. Decent yields are being reported for most corn and soybeans for grain. Barley and wheat are still being seeded after the corn and soybeans are harvested. New seedings of hay look pretty good but could use some moisture to keep it going. Hay continues to be baled in the county also as wet and also dry but takes longer as the dew is still on till lunchtime. Apples continue to be harvested with most growers having nice crops. Growers are hurting with lack of pickers to harvest their crop of apples across the county. Vegetables are still being harvested across the county also and pumpkins are readily available for fall decorating or cooking. Overall the producers are pretty busy in their fields harvesting and seeding for next year's crops.

#### **ADAMS County, Thomas Kerr**

Corn yields so far vary from 180 bu to less than 100 bu. Soybeans are yielding less than normal due to lack of moisture. The dry weather is helping apple harvest and it is now a week ahead of normal, and quality is good.

#### **ADAMS County, Lee Showalter**

Apple harvest is in full swing. About 50% of the fresh market Golden Delicious have been harvested. Red Delicious harvest is underway, with most growers starting this coming week. Quality has been excellent. There have been reported shortages of harvest labor.

#### **ALLEGHENY/BEAVER/BUTLER Counties, Luke Fritz**

Good week for harvesting and planting cover crops.

#### **CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker**

Good outdoor work weather, Crops are drying down and soybean harvest should star in the next few weeks. I had 1/4" rainfall for the week.

#### **COLUMBIA County, John O Yocum**

Again no beneficial rain.

#### INDIANA County, J. Scott Overdorff

All the leaves on corn stalks are turning brown. Right now the moisture is between 25% to 30%. Just waiting for a frost to start shelling some and also going to pick some ears too. Done making hay. The may made this year was average. Second cutting was much better than the first. The soybean have most of the fallen off the stalks and are turning brown-golden brown. A frost will speed up the process for cutting the beans also. The forecast for this week looks like a chance of rain all week. Hope everyone has a safe farming week.

#### JUNIATA / SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

The dry soil conditions continue with the corn drying down to levels below 20%. Soybeans are slow at drying down; however, some are being harvested. The yields of harvested corn and soybeans are above average. Very good late season hay has been made. The main activities for the week were harvesting and haymaking.

#### **MERCER County, Jim Rust**

This past week saw many hay fields harvested with the dry hot days leading to high quality hay. Corn silage harvesting is progressing at a rapid rate. Soybean fields that are harvested look great with no fall ruts - dry fields make harvesting a little more joyful. Area feeder cattle prices have declined more than expected.

#### Potter County, Nicole L Santangelo

A busy week. With most the vegetable crops finished fall tillage and planting of winter cereal grains was full speed. Silage harvest is coming to a close and soybeans harvest will likely begin in the coming week, weather permitting.
