Fair Week for Field Work: Pennsylvania had an average of 3.0 days suitable for field work last week. Reported temperatures for Pennsylvania include an average state average of 58(°F), a high of 86(°F) and a low of 36(°F). Late rains finally arrived, halting field work but providing dry field crops with a needed soaking. Despite the drought, corn yields are expected to be high while soybeans appear likely to trail behind expectations. Apples of good quality continue to be harvested but are expected to finish soon. When weather permitted, field activities last week included corn harvesting and sowing cover crops and grain.

ADAMS County, Judy Behney

Adams County had a cooler morning temperatures last week with temperatures in the 50's and some days only mid 40's. Daytime temperatures also were cooler only 70's as a high if that most days. Tuesday night various amounts of rainfall was received in the county. York Springs area had 2.25 inches and other areas had 2 inches but some areas like New Chester only got around 0.7" of rainfall. Then again Thursday, Friday and Saturday the county received more rainfall. We are wet in the county which has slowed down the harvest and planting for field work. Beginning of the week producers could harvest corn and soybeans but not much later in some parts of the county that received more rain. Seeded on barley and wheat was slowed too with the wet weather. Some recent seeding are emerging now. Some sunshine is needed for all crops. Apple harvest continues with good yields being reported. The county had a wet weekend at the National Apple Harvest Festival so we invite everyone to attend the Festival this coming weekend to enjoy the Adams County Apples and even take home to enjoy later. Vegetables are still being harvested in the county but cooler mornings are starting to happen so the length of their growing season could be getting limited. Overall the producers are busy in the fields when conditions permit. They don't know when the first frost will be and want to get crops harvested as corn and soybeans are drying down.

ADAMS County, Thomas Kerr

Lots of rain this week halted field activities after mid-week. Apple harvest still continuing, with yields and quality nearly normal. Expect some smaller operations will finish this week.

ADAMS County, Lee Showalter

Apple harvest continues to be in full swing with some disruptions from the recent rains. Golden Delicious are mostly harvested with Red Delicious harvest about 50% completed. The harvest of Empires and Jonagolds for the fresh market will conclude in the coming week. Quality and color is good with some sunburn present on Red varieties.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Wet week, Limited field work possible. 2.8 inches of rainfall in my gauge.

COLUMBIA County, John O Yocum

Received a total of 3.5" rain this past week. Stopped corn and soybean harvest, but was needed.

INDIANA County, J. Scott Overdorff

Well another week of cool fall weather. Had only .2 inches of rain Friday evening to Saturday lunch time. No more hay to be made. The corn leaves are still turning brown and the ears are dented and drying down. Should be around 25% right now. Waiting for a frost. Don't have a dryer. The soy beans have most of their leaves fallen off and are turning a nice brown / golden-brown. Depending what variety was planted. Waiting for a frost for them too. Hope everyone has a safe and happy farming week.

JUNIATA / SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

Much needed rain arrived. Over three inches in the past week and it is still raining. Nearly all field activities came to a halt with the rain. Corn harvesting and sowing grain and cover crops were the main activities.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

A wet week put the brakes on harvest. Farmers hoping to be back in the fields in a day or two. Corn yields appear to be excellent in many areas of the county. Soybean yields are more average.

LEBANON, Charlene Ziegler

Rain was widespread this week. Although it was much needed, it also kept the farmers out of the fields.

MERCER County, Jim Rust

We received another 2.0 inches of rainfall Friday and Saturday. Many farmers are opening up fields of corn that are close to home base. Cover crops are growing rapidly with the past 2 weeks of over 4.0 inches of rainfall. The top producers used the dry weather in early Sept. for fertilizer and lime application in the pastures for a successful year in 2016.

YORK County, John Rowehl

Rain this week was great for new forage seedings but came at exactly the wrong time for soybean harvest. Continuing to get reports on excellent corn yields. Good reports on soybean yields so far.
