Excellent Week for Field Work: Pennsylvania had an average of 6.0 days suitable for field work last week. Reported temperatures for Pennsylvania include an average state average of 51(°F), a high of 77(°F) and a low of 21(°F).

While weather was mostly clear, dropping temperatures brought frosts to some late in the week. Corn and soybean harvests continue with average yield and condition mostly ranging from fair to good. The majority of hay harvests have either completed or ended with the oncoming cool weather. Fuji apples remain to be harvested, but activities have encountered delays with recent frosts. Field activities were heavily focused on harvesting corn, soybeans and apples as well as cover crop seedings.

ADAMS County, Judy Behney

Adams County had a pretty nice week of weather. Monday evening some rain received but not much accumulation. Morning dews are pretty heavy so takes till lunchtime to dry off. Temperatures on Monday were into the 70's daytime and morning temperatures were in high 40's to 50's most of the week. Sunday night into Monday this weekend is supposed to be the coldest yet with possible frost. Time will tell. Daytime temperatures Tuesday thru Thursday were in the 60's. Some days were sunny and some were cloudier. Saturday and Sunday most areas of the county had heavy frost and the daytime temps didn't get out of the 40's. Some snow came around Arendtsville around lunchtime on Saturday for a short time and Sunday's weather was various at times sunny then cloudy then some rain/snow showers then sun then cloud all day long. Was breezy both days causing it to feel pretty cool outside. Corn and soybeans continue to be harvested. Some corn has decent yields and others not so good. Soybeans are being reported as pretty good yields but the later soybeans and double cropped will be decided when frost comes. Wheat and barley continues to be seeded after corn and soybeans are harvested. Earlier seeded hay looking pretty good. Cover crops that were already planted look pretty good also. More cover crops will be planted once corn and soybeans are harvested. Hay continues to be made. Apples continue to be harvested. Producers are still having issues with lack of pickers to harvest their crops. Some smaller growers are finishing their harvest. Most producers are reporting decent yields. Vegetables continue to be harvested in the county. Once the frost comes then that will end of the vegetable season. Overall the producers are putting in some long days harvesting their corn and soybeans and are pretty pleased how harvest is going. Still lots of field work to be done before the weather changes.

ADAMS County, Thomas Kerr

Cool weather slowed pasture growth and ended hay making. Corn for grain being harvested with yields average to slightly above. Soybean yields better than expected but not exceptional. Looks like good weather coming up should end most apple harvest by end of the week. Growers are pleased with crop.

ADAMS County, Lee Showalter

Growers will be harvesting Fujis for the fresh market this week. There are also processing apples being harvested. Cold morning temps have delayed harvesting this morning. We have a very heavy frost.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Good week for harvest of corn and soybeans. About 1/8 inch rainfall in my gauge.

INDIANA County, J. Scott Overdorff

This week we had about 5 working days suitable for working in the fields. Had a couple of tenths of rain this week. The subsoil and topsoil are still very dry. Have picked some ear corn and cut some soy beans this last week. The beans are small. The corn ears are an average size but they do have a bright yellow or shiny color this year. Was cold this past week. Only got to 48 degrees this past Saturday, but it's fall. Hope to get some more corn picked and soy beans cut this week. Hope everyone has a safe farming week!

JUNIATA / SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

The harvesting of corn and soybeans continues with good results. The newly seeded crops are beginning to emerge and are looking good. The main activities for the week were harvesting and seeding.

LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Just finishing up the last of corn silage chopping and those who are fortunate enough to get a 4th cut of alfalfa are scrambling to get it in before the weather turns. Had our first 2 frosts Saturday and Sunday night.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

1st killing frost Sunday night. Some farmers making late alfalfa hay. Corn and Soybean harvest progressing well.

LEBANON, Charlene Ziegler

A good week for field work. Temperature was on the chilly side. More soybeans were combined. Corn was also beginning to be harvested for grain. Cover crops were planted on newly opened fields. Manure hauling continued.

MERCER County, Jim Rust

In our area the corn yields are the two extremes high and low all based on soil type and the wet summer. Highest local certified yield (I have seen) on sold corn for a 30 acre field was 169.8 bu. per acre. Early planted beans on well drained soil are producing good yields also.
