Excellent Week for Field Work: Pennsylvania had an average of 6.0 days suitable for field work last week. Reported temperatures for Pennsylvania include a state average of 55(°F), a high of 83(°F) and a low of 26(°F). An unseasonably warm week allowed for the completion of many corn and soybean harvests. Very little harvesting activity for apples as most harvests have completed. Remaining field work has involved manure and lime application, soil testing and planting cover crops.

ADAMS County, Judy Behney

Adams County had a nice week of weather with morning temperatures mostly in the low 50's and daytime into the 70's. Some days broke records for daytime highs. Sunny most days with light winds. Corn and soybean harvest continues during this nice weather period. Producers are limited some due to the mills filling up and scheduling loads being delivered which causes some producers to be held up with harvest. Most are reporting good yields for corn and soybeans. Days are shorter now due to change of clocks but producers still working hard on harvest. Some late wheat and cover crops are also being seeded now once the crop is off. The cover crops and small grains and new forage seedings planted earlier are looking good and liking this week's warmer temperatures. Apple harvest continues and most growers are getting closer to being finished. Most are reporting decent yields also. Overall the producers are busy trying to get their fieldwork done before the weather changes.

ADAMS County, Thomas Kerr

Dry weather this week allowed corn and soybean harvest to wrap up for most operations. Yields of corn and soybeans have been from exceptional to average. Apple harvest is nearly completed and growers are pleased with yield and quality.

ALLEGHENY / BEAVER / BUTLER Counties, Luke Fritz

Early harvest has been completed on most farms. Manure and lime applications being completed. Good weather for soil testing.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Fall field work is winding down. Weather has been great for field work. Pre winter manure application underway along with final corn harvest.

INDIANA County, Scott Overdorff

I forgot to update last week. Anyway, all the soybeans are combined. Finished up picking ear corn. We still have some corn to shell. It will be don this week. Looks like good fall weather this week coming up. That's about it. Don't think we will do any fall plowing. Still could use some rain. The ground is still not recovered from the dry spell that we had this past summer. Just need to shred up some corn stocks before the snow flies. So everyone have a safe farming week!

JUNIATA / SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

Harvesting of corn and soybeans is winding down with most yields being slightly above average. The main activities for the week were harvesting, planting, and spreading fertilizer.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Farmers are still busy finishing up with corn and soybean harvest. Small grains are mostly seeded with some late wheat and cover crop rye still being planted.

LEBANON, Charlene Ziegler

Corn and soybean harvest is wrapping up. Overall, yields are very good. Double crop beans will soon be started. Manure is being spread on fields. Cover crops are planted.

MERCER County, Jim Rust

We have had several "frosty" mornings this fall but the frost of Nov. 8, 2015 seem to finish off any remaining annual "plant or weed" - especially the ones growing in the landscape plantings close to the building. We had 0.5 inches of rainfall early in the week. Area fertilizer dealers were in our area this past week scouting the fields via an ATV taking soil samples for 2016. Farmers with larger fields have the option of soil sampling using the 1-2 acre GPS grids for the proper application of fertilizer throughout the field. I have been notified by several AG machinery companies - one planter mfg. offering huge discounts which is sign of declining sales due to low crop prices and profits.

**COMMENTS FROM MERCER COUNTY 11/01/2015 **

We received 1.9 inches of rainfall last week that slowed down the standing crop harvesting. The forecast for this week is no rain and 5 days with highs in the range of 68 - 73 degrees F. Mercer County has a brand "New" grain handling facility in operation - McCullough Grain opened a second facility - located south of Greenville PA in the rural area of Reynolds (Transfer) area. McCullough Grain will still operate their original facility in Jefferson Twp. Mercer County. – Jim Rust
