

Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather - October 09th, 2016:

Pennsylvania had another good week for field activities with an average of 5.0 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 78°(F), a low of 36°(F) and a state average temperature of 65.1°(F). Decent fall weather for field work, especially with some rain that appeared throughout the weekend. Corn yields are expected to be high also corn for grain harvest approach the midpoint, soybean harvesting is going full tilt with good yields being reported in the area. According to reporters apples continue to be harvested. Corn and soybean harvests continue and tobacco progress continues. According to a reporter, we had 108 continuous days of the temperatures above 70°(F) which broke the record of 1934. The main field activities for the week, harvesting apples, corn, hauling manure and a final clipping of alfalfa, sowing grain, cover crops and planting fall grains.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Cooler weather helping the remaining apple crop. Most other operations included corn harvest for grain, planting wheat, hauling manure and a final clipping of alfalfa.

ALLEGHENY/BEAVER/BUTLER Counties, Luke Fritz

Good weather for harvesting and planting fall grains. Recent rainfall helped the pastures.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Conditions good for fall field work. Some corn harvesting started. Soybean harvest should start during the next week. Only 1/4 inch of rainfall.

INDIANA County, J Scott Overdorff

HAD SOME 3RD CUTTING OF ALFALFA. ALSO SOME 3RD CUTTING OF HAY OTHER THAN ALFALFA. TOOK OFF SOME HIGH MOISTURE CORN LKAST WEEK. TESTED SOME EAR CORN OF MOISTURE THAT WAS PLANTED FIRST AND IT WAS AROUND 22%. OVER ALL THE CORN IS DECENT WHAT THE DEER DIDNT DAMAGE. THE SOY BEANS ARE COMING ALONG NICELY. ALOT OF THE FIRST ONES PLANTED HAVE MOST OF THE LEAVES OFF. SOME OF THE LAST PLANTED STILL HAVE GREEN LEAVES. THEY NEED A FROST SO FINISH THE GROWING CYCLE AND START DRYING OUT. HOPE EVERYYONE HAS A SAFE FARMING WEEK!

JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

A good week for harvesting corn. The quality is below normal due to the drought. Cover crops are doing well following the rain.

Winter grains are being sown and the activity is near completion. Main activities for the week were corn harvesting, sowing grain and cover crops.

LACKWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Fall weather has set in and we received our first frost Sunday night. Dryer weather has helped progress with harvesting silage corn with most farms being complete and the rest finishing up in the next week or two. Getting a fourth cutting of grass hay will be improbably unless there is a significant shift in weather patterns.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Soybeans were not fit to combine for most of last week and the corn picked up a few points of moisture, expect both to be fit this week and to see a lot of field activity. Seeing wheat planted after full season beans and cover crops emerging and growing nicely in harvested silage fields. -- Highest corn and bean yields in the contests thus far have been 264 b/a and 90 b/a respectively.

MERCER County, James P. Rust

Soybean harvesting is going full tilt with good yields being reported in our area. We had 108 continuous days of temperatures above 70 degrees F. which broke the record from 1934. Corn harvesting of shelled corn has also begun. The dry hay baled last week was excellent in quality and yield.
