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Pennsylvania Monthly Crop Weather – April 10th, 2016:

Pennsylvania had a poor week for field activities with an average of 2.5 days suitable for field work. Winter-like temperatures lingered throughout the week with a high of 70(°F), a low of 9(°F) and a state average temperature of only 37(°F).

Various degrees of frost damage were reported for apples and peaches the impact of which will be difficult to predict this early in the season. Cold conditions prevented the majority of fieldwork with activities mostly limited to manure spreading, spraying and topdressing.

ADAMS County, Judy Behney

Adams County had some serious weather conditions that will affect crops this week. Monday was normal temperatures in the 50's but then Tuesday morning was 28 around York Springs and windy, Wednesday was 24 around York Springs and heavy frost on the ground but there was colder temperatures bot Tues/Wed in other parts of the county and Thursday morning was 50 degrees with rain. York Springs had an inch of rainfall but then cleared off after lunch with breezy conditions. Today was 38 degrees and cloudy and breezy. Not much field work was done this week as was only suitable a few days. Forage crops and small grains are showing some growth and greening nicely. Producers are still spreading fertilizer, manure etc. for the crops. At this time small grains look pretty good. Some oats and new seeding of hay are looking pretty good and more will probably be planted here this spring. Fruit crops on the other hand are not known as to the extent of damage due to this week's cold temperatures. Penn State Extension Educators at the Fruit Lab are busy informing the fruit growers of conditions and what to try to do to prevent losses etc. They are very grateful to have their expertise on conditions to help them with their growing fruit crops. Producers are concerned about how much damage but takes a few days to be determined after those conditions and more cold weather predicted for the weekend with some snow also. The stone fruit will be the crops with the most damage as they were out in bloom at different stages. Apples could have some but not known. Producers were trying to keep up with spraying to prevent Scab with the conditions we have had this week and also doing what they could with having fire piles to keep areas warmer to help with the cold temperatures. Mother Nature controls all of the conditions of the crops. Some new trees have been planted this spring and more to be planted as conditions permit. Not many vegetables are planted unless in High Tunnels at this time due to soil temperature and air temperatures. Cold temperatures again Saturday and Sunday will have effects on fruit crops in the county. As you drive around you can see some blossoms that are now brown instead of being pretty flower. The extent of damage will not be known for several days but PSU Extension and fruit growers are monitoring. If producers have crop insurance please remember to contact your crop insurance agent to report the weather related conditions that may affect your crops. Producers are readying their equipment for spring planting seasons and making final arrangements for their operations.

ADAMS / FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Significant cold weather on April 5, 6, and 10th has damaged the peaches and cherries and apples. It is too early to tell how much damage has been done. Depends on location of the orchard and the trees in the orchard, but with lows of 23 on the 5th and 10th, and 8 hours of temperature of 23-25 on the 6th is beyond what fruit buds can tolerate at this stage of development. This cold has affected the entire Northeast fruit area which will surly affect fruit availability this summer.

ADAMS County, Lee Showalter

The cold temperatures over the last week have taken a toll on the peach and apple crops. The pistils in the peaches show a yellowing that is consistent with cold damage. While many apples buds have been damaged, it is too early to tell the extent of damage. We will need a few warm days to make that happen.

ALLEGHENY/BEAVER/BUTLER Counties, Luke Fritz

Apples and peaches are probably impacted by cold weather.

CENTRE County, Dick A Decker

Field work slowed as weather changed to more winter like.

COLUMBIA County, John O. Yocum

Had 2+ inches of snow Sat. All melted except on the North slopes of the Mts. Some ornamental flowers showed frost injury. Don't think apple trees were hurt, but don't know about the other fruit.

COLUMBIA/LUZERNE/MONTOUR, C. John Esslinger

Recent freezes have damaged fruit buds. The extent of the damage will not be known for a couple of weeks.

DAUPHIN/PERRY Counties, Liz Bosak

Another cold week for Dauphin and Perry counties. Powdery mildew is cropping up in small grain fields. Manure and fertilizer spreaders have been going out this month. Winter annual weeds such as chickweed and purple deadnettle are in bloom.

INDIANA County, J. Scoot Overdorff

Have gotten most of the plowing done for oats. Still waiting on some better warmer weather. The grass is growing but have had really colder temps than normal for this time of year. The weather forecast is looking better for the next 10 days. Nothing much else to report at this time. Hope everyone has a SAFE farming week.

JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

Soil temperatures are too low for much plant growth. The alfalfa is growing but has some stress from the freezing temperatures. Early sown oats has finally emerged. Winter grains are looking good. Activities for the week were mainly fertilizer application and manure spreading.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

The current cold snap has really slowed the growth and development of spring grains and cover crops. Tobacco beds are going out and most of the tobacco grown in float houses is up and looking good. Temperatures locally were down into the midtwenties end of the week. Should be able to tell in another day or two if Wheat and other small grains have freeing damage.

LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Cold snap with significant snow and rain has shut down whatever progress had begun at the end of March. Hoping for a dry out mid-week and to resume progress by the weekend.

LEBANON County, Charlene Ziegler

A good week for manure hauling and spreading. The temperature was on the cold side for most of the week. Snow fell on Saturday with some areas receiving over 5 inches.

MERCER County, James P. Rust

Saturday we received 5 inches snow and temperature forecast of 15 degrees F Saturday night.

MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield

Very little field work done this week other than topdressing some hayfields and spraying for cereal rust mites in timothy. Lows in the 20s early in the week likely caused damage to some of the early flowering fruit trees. Accumulating snow on Saturday 4/9 was a reminder that spring is unpredictable. More seasonable temps coming with increase field activity, soon planters will be running.

UNION County, Glenn L. Spangler

Cold weather and wind prevented most field work this past week. Some manure spreading and topdressing forage and pasture fields.

WESTMORELAND County, Thomas Sierzega

Extreme cold temperatures and snow this week. Two days in the teens have set back alfalfa and clover growth. May have had a drastic effect on early fruit bloom.
