# Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – June 26<sup>th</sup>, 2016:

Pennsylvania had a good week for field activities with an average of 5.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of  $92^{\circ}(F)$ , a low of  $46^{\circ}(F)$  and a state average temperature of 71° (F). Due to little rain, crops are under extreme stress and lack of moisture. Corn and soybeans planted earlier are looking pretty good. Wheat harvest is about to begin with the crop looking very good. Barley yields are good. Most of the Barley is now harvested. Some areas received several storms this week that has aided the corn and beans, but flattened some wheat in Adams and Franklin County. Very dry conditions continue in Montgomery County. No measurable rain in the area since June 8th. Crops is hanging in there, but farmers are very concerned about the lack of rain. Field activates, such as haymaking, planting and spraying, nitrogen application and haymaking took place last week hindered only briefly by periods of brief wind and rain.

# **REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County**

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

## **ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney**

Adams County started the week with morning temperature 70 degrees morning and into 80 and sunny on Monday. Tuesday morning was 77 morning temperature and cloudy. Some thunderstorms with rain, hail around 8 am in York Springs, East Berlin areas and about 0.5 inch of rain and later evening part of county around Gettysburg, Bonneville, New Oxford areas had thunderstorm with rain, hail with the rains being about an inch. Wednesday started 67 morning and sunny skies. Thursday was some showers early and 69 degrees but sporadic rainfall as York Springs 0.1 inch and Fairfield had an inch. Evening had some areas getting thunderstorms but missed York Spring area. Friday is 64 morning temperatures and foggy and cloudy. Rains have been very sporadic throughout the county where some spots are dryer than others. Corn and soybeans planted earlier are looking pretty good. Soybeans are still being planted after hay made and will be after barley and wheat are harvested also. Hay was being made on Monday with good conditions and some producers were hoping Tuesday was going to continue but some producers had hay get rained on. More hay has been mowed as no one knows what the weather is going to be in their areas of the county so producers taking the chance to get hay made when they can as they are behind normal hay making schedule. Barley is mostly harvested and wheat is on the verge of getting started to be harvested. Fruit crops are looking ok for the most part. Producers however who had some tart and sweet cherries that survived the frost to some degree got hit Tuesday morning with hail so that had more effect on the cherries the producers thought they were going to get this year. Producers are kept busy with spraying fruit with the help of their field scouts and also Penn State Fruit lab. Vegetables are coming along in the county and looking pretty good. Producers are still busy trying to get fieldwork done when conditions permit.

#### **ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr**

Some areas received several storms this week that has aided the corn and beans, but flattened some wheat. Most of the barley is now harvested. What few cherries that the birds have not gotten have started to turn. Hail was reported in several orchards.

## Centre County, Dick A. Decker

Top soil moisture is low, Showers are hit and miss. Good week for field work. Barley yield are good.

## JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

Showers during the week were widely scattered and not very beneficial. Crops are beginning to suffer from the heat and lack of moisture. Potato leafhoppers are showing in the second growth of alfalfa. Wheat harvest is about to begin with the crop looking very good. Main activities for the week were planting, spraying, nitrogen application and haymaking

# LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Lancaster County had a nice shower come through end of last week and the crops have really responded. Corn is shoulder high in some fields and wheat harvest will be in earnest this week. See high populations of small grasshoppers in grass waterways and field boundaries.

#### **MERCER County, James P. Rust**

Another week with no rainfall. Crops are under extreme stress due to the lack of rain and the main symptom is the curling of crop leaves. Fertilizer side dressing has not had rainfall to benefit the crop. Most days have been 85 degrees F and above. Mercer County Grange Fair is this week.

# **MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield**

Very dry conditions continue. No measurable rain in the area since June 8th. Crops are hanging in there but farmers are very concerned about the lack of rain. First grass cutting hay continues to be made. Barley has been harvested and wheat harvest will likely start this week.
