Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – July 3rd, 2016:

Pennsylvania had an excellent week for field activities with an average of 5.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 94° (F), a low of 41° (F) and a state average temperature of 64° (F). Scattered rainfall across the state has been received with mix sentiment. Those in need of moisture can't seem to get enough while some would prefer dryer weather during their hay and barely harvests as well as wheat harvests which are expected to begin in earnest next week. Despite preferences for wet or dry conditions, current harvests have been reported as being of surprisingly good quality and yield. Corn and soybean growth has nearly caught up despite a late start and the cold spring. Most have positive expectations for yield and quality assuming adequate rains. Field activates consisted primarily of haymaking, spraying, and nitrogen applications.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started week off with morning temperatures around 67 degrees sunny then cloudy with some areas having rain shower after lunch. York Springs 0.1" and Gettysburg and other areas 0.9". Very sporadic rains this early is not looking good in some areas. Stink bugs and Japanese beetles are causing problems with crops. Tuesday was 64 morning and foggy with higher humidity and sunny mid-morning 81 daytime. Wednesday morning temperature 66 with some fog then sunny high 70's. Thursday was blue sunny skies with morning temperature 60 and daytime 80's. Today [Friday] is sunny with some hazy skies morning temperature 60 degrees. Chance of thunderstorms this afternoon. We could use some accumulation of rainfall throughout the whole county to help all crops. Corn and soybeans are progressing. Some areas are in need of rainfall to help the crops get established in growing. Soybeans after hay and barley and wheat is still being done. Barley has been harvested with good yields and wheat is being harvested when weather permits. Oats are maturing. Hay continues to be baled as wet hay and some dry hay as weather permits. Sweet and tart cherries are a loss this year in the county first hit was from cold temperatures earlier this Spring then a week ago 2 different times county received hail and that took care of the rest of cherries that were on the trees. Other fruit crops are looking pretty good. Some apricots and plums are being harvested with some yields affected due to cold temperatures this spring also. Producers busy with spraying accordingly to reports from Penn State Fruit Lab. Vegetables are being harvested now and available throughout the county. Raspberries and blueberries are also being harvested now. Strawberries are done being harvested. Overall the producers are still plenty busy in the fields doing what they can when the weather permits. Reminder to producers of corn and soybeans to report your acreages to your respective FSA offices.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Scattered showers, some areas got a good shower and others nothing. Good week to start wheat harvest. Yields and quality are very good at this time. Finished second cutting of alfalfa.

ALLEGHENY/BEAVER/BUTLER Counties, Luke Fritz

Excellent weather for hay harvest, Wheat harvest will begin soon. Most areas are in need of rain.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Dry conditions slowing crop development. We did get one nice shower yielding 1 inch in my gauge. Top soil moisture is low.

DAUPHIN/PERRY Counties, Liz Bosak

Rainfall has been spotty across Dauphin and Perry counties. Corn and soybean fields are showing drought stress. Insect and disease populations in soybean were low this week.

JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

Showers early in the week produced rainfall in the amount of zero to over three and one-half inches. Corn is growing very rapidly and looks very healthy. Stands of soybeans range from poor to very good. Wheat harvest in commencing and the yields are above average. Main activities for the week were haymaking, spraying and applying nitrogen.

LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Ground is getting dry with very little rain in June. Second/Third cut hay and corn growth could be limited if conditions don't improve.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Wheat harvest is well underway. Quality and yields are surprisingly good considering all the wet weather we had a few weeks ago. Corn is shooting upward and will soon start to see some tassels in early planted fields. In general corn growth behind other years and quite uneven in many fields. A nice shot of water would be welcome in many areas of the county.

LEBANON County, Charlene Ziegler

Lebanon County needs rain. During the past week storms came through but still left areas dry in the northern part of the county. Areas in the southern part received over an inch of rain. Corn and soybeans still look good but need more moisture. Alfalfa is showing signs of leaf hopper. Barley has been combined and the straw baled.

MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield

Some rain came on Monday, Tuesday and Friday, spotty but very beneficial. Still soil moisture is dry overall. Wheat was close to harvest but spotty showers hindered harvest efforts.

WESTMORELAND County, Thomas Sierzega

Good week for field work. Dry conditions with much sunshine.

YORK County, John Rowehl

Wheat harvest is underway with indications of grain yield from fair to good. Thunderstorms crossed the area last week providing varying amounts of much needed rain.
