## Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – August 13th, 2016:

Pennsylvania had an excellent week for field activities with an average of 6.0 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 98°(F), a low of 45°(F) and a state average temperature of 77°(F). Rains continued from the previous week much to the benefit of corn and soybeans, which have been slow to develop all year in the face of poor weather. While both crops have shown recent improvement, the majority of operators have been in contact with their local crop insurance as condition and yield is still expected to be sub-par. Fruit harvests continue, still with varied quality among peaches in particular. Harvesting of oats has nearly finished while tobacco harvests are expected to begin in full sometime next week. Field activities for the week included spreading manure, sowing fall cover crops and haymaking.

# **REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County**

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

## ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County had another hot and humid week. Monday and Tuesday mornings were in the 60's but then the rest of the week started mid 70's and higher. Daytime temperatures were high 80's but some days got into 90's. Some days were cloudier so temperatures didn't seem as hot. Wednesday Gettysburg got about 10 minutes of rain but only around the town and outskirts of town about 1-2 miles. Most areas did not get a drop. Same thing over the weekend some storms but areas are still being missed the same one's that have not been getting rain all summer. The rains can come as far as your neighbors but not make it to your place which is really frustrating to producers. Producers are contacting crop insurance agents about corn and soybeans in those areas to get the adjusters setup to visit their farms. Corn and soybeans in areas where they have been getting rain throughout the summer continue to look good but there are plenty of areas where corn and soybeans look terrible. Oats is being combined. Not much hay being made as it has no regrowth due to lack of moisture. Producers are getting ready for fall seedings and cover crops as weather permits. Peaches continue to be harvested with pretty decent yields. Early apples also being harvested. PSU Fruit lab stating apple harvests will be earlier and the fruit may not keep like other years due to weather conditions. Vegetables continue to grow around the county and available at the farm, farmers markets etc. Overall the producers are readying their equipment for fall harvest and emptying their grain bins to make sure things are ready when that occurs. They are hoping for some more rain to keep crops going a little longer till they can be harvested.

## ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Hot dry weather has taken a toll in dairy production. Reports of as much as 33% less milk the past two weeks. Some corn taken off as forage due to dry weather. Northwest Franklin and Southwest Cumberland counties are extremely dry. Most of the area has not seen any rain since July 4th. Fruit crop still doing well.

### **ALLEGHENY/BEAVER/BUTLER Counties, Luke Fritz**

Oats harvest is winding down, rain is needed. Some producers are planting cover crops for emergency forage later this year.

### **CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker**

Some good badly needed showers during the week. Should help soybeans and 3rd/4th cutting hay. 2.75 inches in the gauge

## JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

The widely scattered brought no relief to the drought and heat. The quality of the crops continue to deteriorate. Evidence of poor pollination on some of the corn. The main activities for the week spreading manure, sowing fall cover crops and haymaking.

### **LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill**

Tobacco harvest will be in full swing this week. In general the crop looks very good. Corn and soybean continue to developing with some early hybrids starting to dent. Silage harvest is only a week or so away. Overall corn and soybeans look good but continue showing moisture stress in some areas of the county. Fourth cutting of alfalfa is mostly finished with good yields being reported. The southern half of the county is in need of rain the most.

## LEBANON County, Charlene Ziegler

Extremely hot and humid weather prevailed over the county this past week. Storms gave some rain but were spotty. Conditions when comparing the northern part of the county with the southern part have not changed very much. There is not much activity out in the fields although some alfalfa has been cut. Milk production is down due to the heat.

### **MERCER County, James P. Rust**

Local weather station is reporting 40 days this summer over 85 degrees F. We have had rain every day this week with a total of 2.8 inches.

### YORK County, John Rowehl

Rain scattered across the area from thunderstorms. Areas that had extreme moisture stress earlier in the season are looking decent now.
