## Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather - September 11th, 2016:

Pennsylvania had an excellent week for field activities with an average of 6.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 97°(F), a low of 43°(F) and a state average temperature of 75°(F). While temperatures slowly increased last week so did humidity, delivering welcome night showers as evening temperatures cooled. Mixed reports have surfaced regarding varied corn and soybean conditions suggesting that poor conditions aren't as widespread as previously thought with parts. This could mean positive things for overall corn and soybean yield but only time will tell. Corn silage harvests are largely underway statewide while tobacco harvests have begun to wind down as they near completion. Field activities for the week included chopping corn for silage, spreading manure and prepping fields for fall seedings.

## ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started week with morning temperatures in 60's and daytime into the 90's and sunny on Monday. Tuesday morning was 66 degrees and sunny and humid. Wednesday was 66 degrees and some clouds and humid but into the 90's daytime. Evening some thunderstorms came through the county and also into the night. Various amounts of rainfall was received with York Springs receiving 1.25" which is the first significant rainfall we received for a while, 0.4" Hunterstown, an inch in Gettysburg, and 2.8" in Biglerville and Fairfield did not receive any and also Littlestown area received very little if any there also. Thursday was hot and humid into mid 90's as rainfall from night before caused the humidity. Thursday morning was 81 and sunny with some humidity. Friday night into Saturday morning York Springs received 0.75" of rainfall and other areas of county also received some rainfall. Saturday was very hot and humid in mid-90's. Sunday was cooler in the 80's and nice breeze all day. Corn silage continues to be harvested as corn is drying down fast and what is damaged from dry weather is really brown and not much ears on those stalks. Some corn for grain is starting to be harvested also in the county. Corn yields will vary around the county this year due to the drought like conditions. Soybeans continue to be mature and some leaves are starting to color. Soybeans are also going to have yields that vary around the county due to drought. Soybean pods on stalks but not filled out. Hay continues to be made when enough regrowth there to harvest as hay is suffering too from drought. Fields are being prepared for fall seedings in next few weeks. Peaches are about done being harvested with decent yields being reported. Apples continue to be harvested also with fruit not holding up due to issues with firmness and apple s breaking down and the finish and coloring isn't normal either from dry weather conditions. Apple yields and quality issues are apparent this year due to weather conditions. Stink bugs are also affecting the fruit crops this year. Vegetables continue to be harvested in the county and most are faring pretty well for weather conditions we have had. All the crops could use some moisture but some will not benefit but will help with future crops. Producers busy doing whatever they can in their fields to get crops harvested and/or planted for the next season.

### **ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr**

Still no rain in western Adams County. Franklin County received up to an inch this week. Corn silage is finished and high moisture corn is being harvested as quickly as possible. Full season soybeans are starting to color. Lots of manure hauled this week onto the fields harvested for silage.

#### **CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker**

Spotty showers provide some relief for top soil moisture. Only 3/8 inch in my gauge.

#### JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

Showers during the week were very light to nothing. Corn and soybeans are heavily stressed from the heat and dry soil conditions. Cover crops are also suffering. Corn silage harvest is in full swing. Main activities for the week were chopping corn, spraying and spreading manure.

#### LANCASTER County, Christopher Burkhart

Hot dry conditions are drying corn very quickly making it a struggle to keep up with silage making. Farmers will be doing high moisture corn next week and I expect to see some combines starting to shell early short season dry corn late next week. Tobacco harvest is mostly finished. White wine grape harvest has started and is of high quality. Continued dry conditions will hurt soybean yields especially double crop soybeans if we don't get rain soon.

#### LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

The Tobacco and corn silage harvests are winding down. The drought is causing early senescence in soybeans and corn. Expect to see high moisture corn being harvested this weed and possibly corn and soybeans for dry grain end of next week. Fall planting of small grains and cover crops is questionable until we receive some much needed precipitation.

# **MERCER County, James P. Rust**

1.4 inches of rainfall over the weekend. Corn silage harvesting has started.

#### **UNION County, James C. Brubaker**

Both corn and beans look good for the stress they have had. We have had a shortage of moisture most of the summer, but the showers that we did have were at the right time plus 5.5" of rain in August. I would expect corn to be in the 185 area. Corn and beans are rapidly maturing and harvest is not far away.

## **UNION County, Glenn L. Spangler**

Cutting corn silage, hauling manure and no-till of winter grains/cover crop seeding.
