Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – October 02nd, 2016:

Pennsylvania had another excellent week for field activities with an average of 4.0 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of $85^{\circ}(F)$, a low of $31^{\circ}(F)$ and a state average temperature of $65.6^{\circ}(F)$. Late rains finally arrived, providing dray field crops with a needed soaking. Despite the drought, corn yields are expected to be high while soybeans appear likely trail behind expectations. According to our reports apples continue to be harvested with reports indicating maturity is earlier than normal. Corn and soybean harvests continue and tobacco progress continues to look good. The majority of fieldwork involves, harvesting apples, corn, vegetables and soybeans, soil preparation, cover crops being seeded, lime and manure applications being completed, pasture grasses are starting to grow again.

October 2, 2016 Pennsylvania Weekly Weather Summary

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started the week off with morning temperatures on Friday at 52 degrees and cloudy and midafternoon 62 degrees and cloudy. Tuesday morning was 61 degrees and cloudy and fog 0.1" York Springs overnight and daytime 66 degrees by lunch and blue sky and 74 later afternoon. Wednesday morning was 56 and morning and cloudy/foggy then into the 60's. Thursday morning was 59 degrees and raining off and on and York Springs received 0.5" and Hunterstown area had an inch and Gettysburg had 1.5 inches with some areas south of Gettysburg receiving 4 inches. Friday was cooler and damp with various rain throughout the day. York Springs received an inch during the day and over the weekend Saturday was rainy all day with downpours and drizzle then downpours all day long. Most areas now have had at least 3 inches since last Thursday with many areas having more than 3 inches. Corn and soybeans were harvested early last week but slowed when rains came. Some corn silage is still being cut depending when the corn was planted as to the stage of it. Majority of corn has been affected by the lack of rainfall this summer. Earlier planted corn and soybeans were not affected as much with yields but still not normal. Barley and wheat are starting to be seeded after corn and soybean harvest. Some hay made but weather wasn't the best last week. Apples continue to be harvested with reports indicating maturity is earlier than normal. Stink bugs are affecting the crop along with Bitter Rot due to hot and humid summer and now the recent rains washing off fungicides and storing apples is the concern with rotting occurring. There are still a fair amount of apples to harvest in the county. Some producers have nice yields where others do not have much of a crop. Quality issues are apparent with lots of apples going to processing due to their finish. Apple country welcomed visitors to the 52nd National Apple Harvest Festival this past weekend even though the rain fell in that area and are looking for a better weekend for October 8-9 for the Festival. Come out to enjoy everything that you can think have made from apples. Vegetables are winding down for the season and are available at local markets and fruit stands. The producers are busy harvesting and planting whenever field conditions are available to do so. Shorter daylight keeps them moving to get things done around the farm.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Finally some rain, and cool weather. Too late to do any good for crops but will be good for pastures and fall grains. Apple crop is

coming out shorter than expected, but still a decent crop for most varieties.

ALLEGHENY/BEAVER/BUTLER Counties, Luke Fritz

Rainfall was prevalent throughout the area. Soybean harvest starting, cover crops being seeded, lime and manure applications being completed, pasture grasses are starting to grow again.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Some badly needed rain during the week. I had 2.75 inches in the gauge. Rainfall should be beneficial to recent barley and wheat seeding's.

COLUMBIA County, John O Yocum

Soybean harvest has started. Pigweed species are pollinating or have set seed at this point. No soybean diseases or insect pests to report for this week.

MERCER County, James P. Rust

Received 2.0 inches of rainfall this past week. No hay was harvested and very little field work occurred due to the rain. No frost is in the forecast for the next 10 days
