Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather - May 14th, 2017:

Pennsylvania had another fair week for field activities with an average of 3 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 73° (F), a low of 24° (F) and a state average temperature of 59° (F). Cooler temperatures throughout the region with some rain closing up the weekend. A small frost was reported on Monday morning in some parts of the State, which, according to reporters, didn't cause any significant damage. Some corn has been planted, but the majority of producers have not started due to wet soil conditions and cooler temperatures, rain and cold weather slowed corn and soybean planting. With the rain and cold temperatures, there was a short window of opportunity this week when field conditions were suitable for planting. Main activities for the week were spraying, spreading manure and some farmers taking a first cutting of alfalfa hay.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County is still pretty wet to get much field work done. Monday started 37 morning temperature with some frost high mid 50's and sunny. Tuesday morning 37 morning temperatures but heavier frost than Monday and sunny. Wednesday was 53 morning temperature with some sun and clouds and afternoon was 64. Thursday was 44 degrees morning and into the 50's daytime but cloudy and rainy all day. York Springs had 0.5" and other areas had 0.6" south of Gettysburg and 0.4 around Hunterstown. Today 51 morning temperature and cloudy but calling for rain later today and tomorrow up to an inch forecasted. Corn planting and soybean planting are on hold due to weather conditions in the county. Some corn has been planted but majority of producers have not started as too wet soil conditions and temperature not that warm. Producers in past years had to replant and producers are not interested in doing the work twice and have costs of replanting. Producers are spraying fields for anticipation of Notilling corn in the future. Some forage was chopped earlier in the week but no additional acreage mowed due to poor weather conditions. Small grains are looking pretty good and have heads now. Hay continues to grow but reported to be shorter than most years. Producers still trying to sell their hay from last year. Fruit growers are being kept busy keeping up with their spraying for diseases and insects and also some chemical thinning here in May has been done. The apples, peaches and cherry crops look good for now. No apricots or plums this year due to cold temperatures in March during bloom. Overall the producers are staying busy and are anxiously awaiting to get into full bore planting corn and soybeans.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Some apple growers are complaining that there was a poor set, and mow they are seeing an early indication that the crop will not be as good as they expected even in early May.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Some field work possible during the past week. Soil moisture prevented some planting on heavy clay soils. Added 3/4 inch in the gauge.

RAIN AND COLD WEATHER SLOWED CORN AND SOYBEAN PLANTING AND EMERGENCE OF CROPS PLANTED

DAUPHIN/PERRY County, Liz Bosak

Another week of cool wet weather with temperatures two to nine degrees below normal and total precipitation for the month ahead by 0.84 inches. There was a short window of opportunity this week when field conditions were suitable for planting. Weed emergence has slowed with the cooler temperatures. May apple along the Appalachian Trail is in bloom.

JUNIATA/SNYDER County, William C. Sheaffer

Rainfall for the week is in the one half inch range. Chopping of forage is in full swing. Corn and soybean planting is slow due to the moisture and temperatures. All crops are looking good. Main activities for the week were harvesting, spraying and spreading manure.

LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Constant rain has put a damper on spring crop activity and led to muddy pastures across the County. With a dryer 10 day forecast ahead, most farmers will be completing a bulk of their corn/hay planting, manure spreading and some farmers may take in a first cutting of grass hay/alfalfa.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

First cutting of alfalfa has started, with lots of corn and soybean still in their bags. The week ahead looks good and I expect a lot of progress to be made in the field. Calls for weevil and pea aphid in alfalfa seem to have slowed down as first cutting approaches

MERCER County, James P. Rust

Corn planters finally were busy in the fields this past week. Several 80 degrees plus days are in the forecast for this week. Many hay fields are being cut for silage.

MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield

More rain puts a halt to field work for a while, 1.6" of rain fell Saturday. Some frost is the low areas on Monday 5/8 but it didn't cause any significant damage. Corn that was planted 5/1 is emerging, not much corn planted before that but that which was planted is yellow. This upcoming week looks much warmer and drier, field work should pick up by mid-late week.

UNION County, James C. Brubaker

Another wet week. Little field work done this past week.

York County, John Rowehl

Wheat has all headed out. Foliar diseases minimal.
