Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – May 21st, 2017:

Pennsylvania had another excellent week for field activities with an average of 6 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 93° (F), a low of 23° (F) and a state average temperature of 77° (F). The weather finally shifted last week with a welcome wave of heat and sunshine. Farmers that were behind with corn and soybean planting took advantage of the opportunity to catch up. Those who managed to plant early have seen both corn and soybeans recently emerge. Fruit continues to mature and conditions have only improved with the arrival of warm temperatures. Field activities for the week were harvesting of forage crops with the cutting, raking and baling of grass and alfalfa hay in progress at most if not all farms with hay fields; planting corn, soybeans and spreading manure. Hot day's last week helped emerged corn green up.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started the week off in the 50's and daytime high 70's on Monday but Tuesday through today daytime temps were high 80's and low 90's and sunny. Thursday late afternoon southern part of county had a rain shower but no other rain this week. Corn planting continues as most producers are behind normal planting in years past and soybeans are starting to be sown. A lot of spraying and preparation for planting going on in the county. Small grains are headed and growing in height. Amazing what rain and sunshine/heat will do to improved crop conditions. Hay continues to grow and first cutting is being harvested. Fruit growers are busy with keeping up with their spraying during this important time of the fruit crop production for diseases and insects. Apples, cherries and peaches are looking good. No apricots or plum crops this year due to earlier cold weather during bloom. Vegetables are being planted and growing around the county. Strawberries are starting to be picked around the county. Overall the producers are busy with fieldwork with harvesting of forage crops and planting going on simultaneously.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Haylage first cutting finishing up this week and now back to finishing up planting corn. Some soybeans planted as well. Fruit still too early to tell what the crop will be like.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Great week for catching up on field work. Most of the corn is planted. Alfalfa hay making well underway. Less than 1/4 inch of rainfall.

DAUPHIN/PERRY County, Liz Bosak

Hot, dry weather has allowed for field activities to resume. Cutting, raking, and baling grass and alfalfa hay was in progress at most, if not all, farms with hay fields. Corn and soybeans are emerging in fields. Most cover crops are terminated..

JUNIATA/SNYDER County, William C. Sheaffer

Much needed light rain beginning to fall. Crops are looking good. Main activities for the week were planting, harvesting, and spraying.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Seeing some early barley fields with a hint of yellow. First cutting of alfalfa is wrapping up. There is a lot of corn still in the bag waiting for good weather and hay harvest to finish.

MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield

Hot and dry weather by mid/late week dried field enough for planting. Some farms finished planting corn others have a few more good days of planting to go yet. First cutting hay and baling has started and rye straw was baled. Monday the rains returned and it looks like a cool and damp week with little field work expected.

WESTMORELAND County, Thomas Sierzega

Very warm temperatures with dry conditions allowed for much progress in corn and soybean prep and planting. Hay being cut and wrapped or put in the silo. Wet weather toward end of week.

York County, John Rowehl

Wheat is in flowering stage. Fungicides for head scab protection applied in some fields. Barley Yellow Dwarf Virus observed in places. Hot days last week helped emerged corn green up.
