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## Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – May 28th, 2017:

Pennsylvania had a fair week for field activities with an average of 3.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 80° (F), a low of 37° (F) and a state average temperature of 60° (F). It was a rainy week with some locations across the state having up to 2 inches of precipitation. Wet weather still keeping a lot of corn and soybeans in the bag. Most fields which have emerged look very good. Hay for forage was chopped early week but also has stopped due to field conditions. Some hay has lodged from heavy rains. Hay continues to grow in height. Small grains are looking pretty good. Field activities were limited due to the rain, but some cutting of hay and planting early in the week.

# **REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County**

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

#### ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County's morning temperatures have been around 56 degrees all week. Daytime temperatures have been mid 60's. Sunshine Monday through Wednesday but then early Thursday morning rain started and ended about lunchtime on Thursday. York Springs received 1.5 inches and other parts of the county received about the same amount. We are wet so fieldwork halted. Corn and Soybeans were planted Monday thru Wednesday but with the rainfall received Thursday planters/drills have stopped due to wet field conditions. Some of the earlier planted corn and soybeans are now emerged but need some sunshine. Hay for forage was chopped early week but also has stopped due to field conditions. Some hay has lodged from heavy rains vesterday morning. Hay continues to grow in height. Small grains are looking pretty good. Apples, peaches and cherry crops are looking pretty good. Peaches are about golf ball size and apples are growing too from viewing from roadway. Producers are kept busy with spraying for insects and diseases this time of the year. Vegetables are doing well. Strawberries are being harvested now in the county. Overall the producers are being kept on their toes with all different types of work going on at the same time. All hoping for nice crops this year.

#### ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Weather was wet and cool this week but which limited the field work. Need some warmer temperatures to get the crops going. Fruit still looks good.

#### **CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker**

Some fiend work possible between rain events. Corn and beans have emerged and look good. Grass hay starting to head, some dry weather needed to harvest dry hay. 1.25 inches of rainfall for the week.

#### DAUPHIN/PERRY County, Liz Bosak

Another cool and rainy week for Dauphin and Perry Counties. Corn and some soybean fields are between emergence and v2 growth stages. Wheat and other small grains are flowering. In woodland areas, lady slipper orchids, mountain laurel, and brambles are in bloom

# JUNIATA/SNYDER County, William C. Sheaffer

Nearly one inch of rainfall was the norm for the area. Barley is lodging and the wheat is flowering. The chopping of forage is near completion. Very little dry hay has been made. Planting and spraying were the main activities for the week

#### LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Farmers are scattering to plant corn and take in first cuttings of silage hay in the brief period of dry weather that was had this past week. With a week of rain in the forecast, spring planting and harvests will continue to be a challenge. Pasture conditions continue to improve after a muddy start to the spring.

# **LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill**

Wet weather still keeping a lot of corn and soybeans in the bag. Most fields which have emerged look very good. Seeing some slug and cutworm damage in corn. Not nearly as extensive as last year at this period in time. Hearing of moderate leaf hopper infestations in alfalfa. Some folks are spraying second cutting most waiting until after second cutting.

## **MERCER County, James P. Rust**

3.1 inches of rainfall this past week. Need warmer temperatures and sunlight for the crops to a rebound.

#### **MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield**

Poor week for field work. Around 2.5" of rain fell in the past week. No field work except for a little spraying. About 1/2 the corn still needs to be planted and the majority of the soybeans. Most of the alfalfa has been cut but nearly all the grass hay remains to be cut. Fields are saturated and a few days of sun are needed just to allow traffic back on them.

## **SOMERSET County, Dale Kriner**

2.5 inches of rain fell over the weekend. Several heavy downpours resulted in some flooding. A lot of gully erosion also occurred and is readily apparent.

# WESTMORELAND County, Thomas Sierzega

Damp conditions early week slowed corn and soybean planting. Second half of week good for planting and haying.

# YORK County, John Rowehl

Slow emergence and growth of corn and soybeans. Wheat fields generally in flower.
