Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – September 11th, 2017:

Pennsylvania had a good week for field activities with an average of 4.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 88° (F), a low of 34° (F) and a state average temperature of 61° (F). Decreasing temperatures slowed the progress on bean maturity, but the crop still looks excellent. Thunderstorm and rain were reported in some areas with some strong wind, heavy rain and hail. Peach harvest is nearly completed, growers are satisfied with their crop. Apples, vegetables and pumpkins continue to be harvested and are available at farmers markets. Field activities involved the harvesting of apples, potatoes, and pumpkins with some corn silage.

REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County had nice start of week on Monday sunny and 80 degrees. Tuesday nice weather till around 3:30 pm then storms ripped Adams County up. Some areas harder hit than others but all had wind, rains, hail and trees and wires down. Some areas without electric for almost 24 hours. Hard hit areas had farm equipment buildings, shops, bank barn roofs and total buildings blown apart from straight line winds. Producers having issues with getting insurance adjusters out to access damage due to being in Texas. York Springs had 1.5 inches of rainfall during storm and hail from pea size to quarter size in the county. Wednesday morning was 50 degrees and only 60 during day but rainy and cloudy all day long. 1.25 inches around York Springs. Thursday was sunny started in 50's and got into 70's daytime. Today is 50 morning and sunny. Corn and soybeans continue to mature. Some corn silage being harvested the beginning of week till Tuesday's storm came in afternoon. Some early special variety soybeans are being harvested also. Very little hay made due to weather this week. Fields have scattered debris from storms on Tuesday so producers have to watch when working in the fields. Peach harvest is completed but still some available at fruit markets or farmers markets. Apples continue to be harvested. Apples took a hit with hail damage from Tuesday's storms and also had from earlier hail this summer. Asian pears also damaged from hail that were just about ready to be harvested. No guarantees with crops until they are harvested and in the bins for damage that storms/weather can do. Vegetables continue to be harvested along with pumpkins throughout the county. Available at farmers markets and at farm markets. Overall the producers had slow

week of field work but kept plenty busy with cleanup or dealing with storm damage and dealing with insurance companies.

ADAMS/FRANLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Cool weather has slowed the progress on bean maturity, but crop still looks excellent. Corn fodder is drying down finally enough to allow decent silage harvesting conditions. Tonnage is excellent. Peach harvest is completed with growers satisfied with their crop. Apples are ahead of schedule with a very normal crop expected. A producer south east of Chambersburg has planted 80 acres of black oil sunflowers and they are now in full bloom - - a great sight on a large rolling hill field.
