#### Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather - April 3rd, 2017:

Pennsylvania had another fair week for field activities with an average of 4.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 64°(F), a low of 15°(F) and a state average temperature of 34°(F). Warmer weather conditions slowly continue to increase as expected at this time of the month, plums are starting to bloom slowly, in some areas. Fields are wet from the snow melting and some rain last week. Fruit trees are greening up and starting to open their buds flowering. Very little field activity for the week due to a combination of cool temperatures and wet soil, some spaying of wheat fields and manure spreading.

#### ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County is pretty wet with showers throughout the week. Today we are to get 1-2 inches which will cause ponding/flooding. Not much sunshine during the week until some late afternoons just for a little. Most days were 50's and nighttime was 35 Wednesday. The producers have not been in the fields at all this week. In their shops preparing equipment for future fieldwork. We could use some sun and warmer temperatures. Things are greening up and fruit trees are now starting to open their buds flowering.

#### ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Plums and apricots are showing some scattered bloom, but too early to determine what the other fruit crop will be like. Showers held back any field work. General rain Friday was welcome.

#### **CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker**

Time for some fence row brush cutting, preparing machinery for use when the weather breaks. 1 inch of rainfall for the week.

#### COLUMBIA County, John O. Yocum

### COLUMBIA/LUZERNE/MONTOUR Counties, C. John Esslinger

Tree fruit pruning continues.

#### **DAUPHIN/PERRY Counties, Liz Bosak**

Dauphin and Perry Counties With the precipitation from this past week, most fields were not fit for fieldwork especially in low lying areas near creeks and streams. Winter annual weeds are rapidly growing and have begun flowering in corn fields. Forsythia and spicebush (Lindera benzoin) is in bud or flower at lower elevations

#### JUNIATA/SNYDER County, William C. Sheaffer

The winter crops are beginning to show new life. However, so is the chickweed, henbit and others. Rainfall in the range of one inch so far seems to be the norm.

#### LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Snow melt and spring rains have the ground saturated to its capacity

#### **LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill**

The county is several inches behind would benefit from predicted rains this coming week. Tobacco Farmers are especially looking for some wet humid weather in order to bring the crop down from the barns into their cellars and stripping rooms to begin stepping the leaves.

#### MERCER, County, James P. Rust

2.8 inches of rainfall this week. No field work being done

#### **MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield**

Rain continues to prevent most field activity. Over 2" of rain fell last week with another inch or two coming this week will not allow any field work to be done. Small grains and cover crops look good.

#### UNION County, James C. Brubaker

Spring is coming and cover crop has come through the winter in good shape

#### UNION County, Glenn L. Spangler

Very little field work done due to a combination of cool temperatures and wet soil conditions. Minor spraying of wheat fields and manure spreading

Extremely wet fields with more rain forecast for tonight and tomorrow.

Wheat is taking off. Earlier planted fields are at or beginning to reach jointing stage.
