Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – April 17th, 2017:

Pennsylvania had another good week for field activities with an average of 5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 87°(F), a low of 22°(F) and a state average temperature of 69°(F). The warm and nice weather finally dried the soils enough to do some field work. Winter crops continue to grow and fruit trees appear to be progressing rapidly, peaches were blooming, while some early varieties of apples were starting to bloom in some areas. Fair weather provided excellent opportunities for field work, oats seeding, manure spreading, burning down cover crops spraying winter cover crops and preparing equipment.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County had nice week of weather drying out from the week before rainfall from April 6th. Most days had sunshine and some breeze. The temperatures were above normal. Sunday was mid 80's and sunny. Producers are hauling manure where field conditions permit and also fertilizer. They are also getting ready to start planting corn. Wheat and barley seeded early last fall are looking pretty good and growing in height but later planted is not as good. The warm sunny days are helping the crops. Hay is starting to grow now also and looking ok. Oats seeded in February is looking ok. Fruit growers are busy with applying spray materials as needed for conditions of all fruit. Peach bloom is about over but the end of last week and weekend have the cherry blossoms blooming. There are some apple blossoms here and there blooming also with more to come in next week. At this time the apricots and plums are looking like there will be a loss of crop this year but the other fruits are still wait and see till mid-May. They are hoping for a good year since last year's conditions were not too good for fruit growers. Some vegetables being planted with plastic in the county. The producers are anxiously awaiting weather conditions to get into the planting season to get the corn and soybeans planted for this year hoping for a good year of weather and yields.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Good week for hauling manure fertilizing wheat, pasture a preparing to plant corn. Saw some corn being planted and alfalfa seeding. Fruit looks good at this time. Still short on total rainfall.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Good week for field work. Farmers catching up on plowing, spraying, alfalfa and oats seeding. 3/8 inch of rainfall in the gauge.

Lots of oats was planted this past week. Soil is warming up fast along with the warm rainfalls we have had. Most hay fields were fertilized-top-dressed this week.

MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield

Very good week for field work to get underway. I don't know of anyone in the area that planted field corn but the first plantings of sweet corn were planted on many farms. Other activities included: spreading fertilizer, spraying wheat, burning down cover crops and preparing equipment.
