Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – April 23rd, 2017:

Pennsylvania had another fair week for field activities with an average of 4 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 88° (F), a low of 26° (F) and a state average temperature of 57° (F). Some areas around the state saw up to 3.5 inches of precipitation. Cherries, apples and peaches are in full bloom. Some vegetables have been planted around the state using plastic. Fair weather provided limited opportunities for field work, spraying, spreading manure and preparation for planting were the main activities for the week.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started the week off in the 80's and sunny on Monday and Tuesday was mid 70's and sunny. Wednesday was cloudy 48 morning but got to 60's. Thursday was cloudy and some showers during day then cleared off afternoon a little then clouded over with thunderstorms during the evening hours and some rainfall over night. Friday morning started off 60 degrees and raining. Since yesterday morning York Springs received 0.5" of rainfall while other areas have received more around the county. Some areas this morning on way to work didn't have wipers on but others raining pretty good so wipers were on regular. We are thankful for the moisture we are receiving as is beneficial to the soil moisture level. Corn and soybean planting is about to start beginning of next week around the county. Small grains seeded last fall early are really looking good and growing in height and being top dressed. If seeded later doesn't look as good but coming along except where it lays wetter and drowned out. Spring oats continues to be seeded. Hay continues to grow and being top dressed also. Plenty of manure and fertilizer being hauled around the county this week. Cherry blossoms were beautiful early this week with nice bloom hoping that means good yields this year. Apple blossoms are also pretty prevalent in the county and some earlier varieties are in full bloom. Fruit growers are being kept busy with their spray schedules. Some vegetables have been planted around the county using plastic. Producers are finishing their equipment preparations for planting and harvesting equipment and getting ready to roll in the fields.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Mostly getting ready for planting corn as soon as soil is fit. Apples are in full bloom, and it appears that the crop is in excellent condition. Still several weeks for possible frost damage.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Good week for spring farm tasks. Some rain prevented field work during several days. Soil moisture is good and as soil temperatures warm corn planting will be getting started.

JUNIATA/SNYDER County, William C. Sheaffer

Light rainfall in the area ranged from less than a tenth of an inch to nearly one-half inch. A good week for field work with some corn being planted. Winter grain and alfalfa crops are looking good. Spraying, spreading manure and preparation for planting were the main activities for the week.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Most of the ryelage has been harvested or is laying on the ground. Hoping for some sun in order to get back into the field and chop what's laying. Barley is heading, which is a week or so ahead of normal. Corn planters were rolling last week, some have chosen to wait out this wet period due to concerns about slugs and extended period of wet weather.

MERCER County, James P. Rust

The severe storms Thursday night by past us to the south. We only received 0.3 inch of rainfall. Soil is warming up fast with 75-80 degrees forecasted for next week.

UNION County, James C. Brubaker

Manure is all spread and ready to start planting. Planning to get a lot of beans in early to hopefully harvest early for early fall cover crop. Excellent moisture conditions with 1" rain Sunday morning.
