Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather - July 9th, 2017:

Pennsylvania had a good week for field activities with an average of 5.0 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 91° (F), a low of 44° (F) and a state average temperature of 71° (F). A good week for field activities. Some rainfall was reported across the State. Sweet and tart cherry harvest is complete. Fruit crops are doing ok in most areas. Vegetables are looking pretty good so far. Overall producers very busy in fields and hoping for some rain the rest of the summer. Rain during the week that improved the condition of corn and soybeans greatly. Daily temperatures have been above average which is good for the crops. Hay quality has been poor due to the weather.

Main activities for the week were harvesting, haymaking and spraying.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started the week with morning temperatures in the high 60's and daytime into the mid 80's with humidity and mostly sunny. Some areas around Littlestown had heavy rain about an inch but most areas didn't get any in the county. Was about the same thru Wednesday temperature wise. Thursday was 70 morning temperature and rainy most of the day and got into low 80's. York Springs had 0.5" of rainfall. This morning heavy rain York Springs area but closer to Gettysburg not much rain coming down. Corn is looking pretty good. Some fields though aren't looking too good but not known if from spray application or topdressing or insects? Producers did have to replant some corn this year. Soybeans are looking pretty good and double-cropped after wheat are being finished planting now. Some wheat still is standing to be harvested. Most producers are reporting very good wheat crop, test weight, moisture and other tests done by mills. Barley in most cases were good yields but some had cold temperatures when coming out this Spring so not much grain there to harvest. Hay continues to be made when weather permits. Still plenty of work being done in the fields. Peaches continue to be harvested with good yields. Apples continue to look good. Cherry harvest is completed with some losses being reported but not as bad as once thought. Cherry prices are very poor and Knouse Foods Coop was limiting producers to how much they could deliver. Very few plums, apricots in the county. Vegetables are being harvested throughout the county and readily available at farmers markets or farm fruit stands. Adams County farmers are doing pretty good but still running a little behind schedule for the year as the Spring threw some interesting times for the producers.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Week started off well for farm work, but showers and rain later in the week slowed harvest. Wheat yields have been excellent. Some reported over 100 bu. per acre. Barley yields were less than normal, heads were short. Early corn is shoulder high with some fields in the southern part of the county now showing tassels.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Crops are looking better as a result of recent rainfall. Corn was knee high by the 4th of July in most fields. Second cutting hay fields looking good. 1/2 inch rainfall in the gauge.

JUNIATA/SNYDER County, William C. Sheaffer

Nearly three inches of rain during the week that improved the condition of corn and soybeans greatly; but it limited the amount of field work.
