Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – September 5th, 2017:

Pennsylvania had a good week for field activities with an average of 5.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 86° (F), a low of 36° (F) and a state average temperature of 61° (F). Good week for making hay but cool weather slowed soybeans. Peach harvest is wrapping up with decent yields being reported. Apple harvest in full swing. Vegetables are still being harvested and available at farm markets. Field activities included making hay, preparing for fall harvest, seeding of cover crops and other tillage for fall crops.

September 3, 2017 Pennsylvania Weekly Weather Summary

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started Monday out with morning temperature 53 degrees and sunny and mid 70's. Tuesday was 53 degrees and cloudy and rainy. 0.3" inch of rainfall York Springs and 65 degrees. Wednesday was 60 degrees and sunny and 77 degrees daytime. Thursday was 55 degrees with sun and clouds and daytime 80 degrees. Today started at 53 degrees and cloudy. The temperatures this week were more like fall temperatures instead of end of August. More rain in forecast for the weekend. Corn and soybeans continue to mature. Certain varieties of early soybeans are about to be harvest in southern part of county. Other soybeans are still pretty green and have not changed colors yet. Corn is starting to dry down but still very green. Corn silage will soon be harvested as corn continues to dry down. Hay continues to be baled as weather permits. Cover crops are being seeded around the county and some other tillage for fall crops. Peaches continue to be harvested but are about done. Nice yields are being reported this year for peaches. The peach market was going pretty good but there is plenty of peaches to be purchased. If you want to enjoy fresh peaches need to get here in the next week or so. Apples continue to be harvested as varieties become ready which are about 2 weeks earlier than normal. Nice crop is being reported. Vegetables are still being harvested and available around the

county at farmers markets or roadside stands. Overall the producers are readying their equipment for fall harvest season and surely will be lack of storage around the county for corn and soybeans with the good yields that are expected.

ADAMS/FRANLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Good week for making hay. Hauling manure. Chopping corn for forage began in most areas this week. Did notice that it was wet, even though the grain was at the right maturity. Stalks are still green. Yields were in the high tonnage range, but this may be due to the moisture in the stalks.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Cool weather has slowed soybeans. 3/4 inch rainfall for the week.
