## Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – November 26th, 2017:

Pennsylvania had a good week for field activities with an average of 5.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 60° (F), a low of 17° (F) and a state average temperature of 37.5° (F). Corn and soybeans continue to be harvested when ground conditions permit. Some cover crop is still being seeded after soybeans and corn are harvested. Fruit crops are all harvested with most having decent yields but some had issues with quality due to hailstorms earlier this year. Producers are starting the process of pruning their trees here in December. Corn and soybean harvesting, baling fodder, preparing farming operations for winter and maintenance on equipment were the major activity of the week.

# **REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County**

#### ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County's weather was still pretty wet till about Wednesday when producers started getting back in the fields. Temperatures were high 20's morning and into the 40's most days. Friday and Saturday were nice and sunny and mid 50's daytime. Sunday was breezier and about 50 degrees with sun and clouds. Corn and soybeans continue to be harvested when ground conditions permit. There are still a lot of fields of standing corn and soybeans which is not usual for this time of the year but producers have been waiting till conditions permit and corn wasn't drying down earlier this fall. Mills are slowing the progress as unloading is timely this year. Good yields are being reported for both corn and soybeans this year. Some cover crop is still being seeding after soybeans and corn are harvested. Fruit crops are all harvested with most having decent yields but some had issues with quality due to hailstorms earlier this year. Producers are starting the progress of pruning their trees here in December. Overall the producers of all agricultural crops had pretty decent yields for 2017 and are grateful for that. They are preparing their farming operations for winter conditions and finishing up harvesting and maintenance on their equipment.

#### **ADAMS/FRANLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr**

Cool weather and dry. Corn harvesting and baling fodder along with soybean harvest were the major activity of the week.

#### **CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker**

Good week for finishing corn harvest.

#### JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

The harvesting of corn and soybeans is near completion with yields being above average. Late seeding of cover crop is near completion. Main activities for the week were harvesting, seeding and winterizing machinery.

#### LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Harvest is finally wrapping up, with a few fields of corn and soybean remaining as well as late plantings of wheat and cover crop. Cover crops and small grains look very good going into the winter months. Folks starting to strip tobacco.

#### **MERCER County, James P. Rust**

November is the third wettest in history at 6.1 inches of rainfall. No field work was done this past week.

#### YORK County, John Rowehl

Condition of standing corn in some fields took a hit following the rain and then high winds Saturday preceding this week. Still some corn and soybeans to finish up harvesting.
