Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather June 3rd, 2018:

Pennsylvania had a fair week for field activities with an average of 3.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 93° (F), a low of 49° (F) and a state average temperature of 71° (F). Another wet week slowed the progress on planting corn and soybeans. Cereal leaf beetle larvae have reached the later larval stages and have begun to pupate. Small grains may be heavily damaged by cereal leaf beetle. Wet weather making it difficult to keep up with spraying. The first corn is looking good, up around 4"-5" now. The oats came up in 5 days after being planted. Wet weather making it very difficult to get hay mowed. Strawberries are being harvested but with all of the rainy days, quality and taste will not be real good. Vegetables are doing well if in high tunnels but some outside vegetables have not been able to be planted yet

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County had another wet week of weather. Every day was cloudy and rainy. Morning temperatures were 68-70 degrees and humid and got into 80's. Tuesday afternoon got some sunshine. York Springs had 0.5 inch of rainfall yesterday into this morning but other days just enough moisture to mess conditions up for being in the fields. Forecast is to get more rain thru Tuesday. Not much additional corn or soybeans were planted this week due to wet field conditions. Some of earlier corn is being replanted due to poor stands. Producers are really concerned because it's June 1st and hardly any corn or soybeans are planted in the county. RMA coverage goes down each day after final plant date of June 10th for corn and June 20th for soybeans. Hardly any forage has been chopped as field conditions do not permit equipment in fields without tracking with tires and then having ruts next time over field. Some hay is lodging due to heavy rain falls. Wheat and barley are looking pretty good but if this rain continues could start to affect it. Fruit crops are looking ok but different stages and damp wet weather is causing some diseases and producers spraying according to Penn State Fruit Labs recommendations. Strawberries are being harvested in the county but with all of the rainy days quality and taste will not be real good. Vegetables are doing well if in high tunnels but some outside vegetables have not been able to be planted yet. Producers are biting at the bit to be able to do something in their fields as this wet weather this spring has all kinds of activities needing to be done but will be all at one time. They are hoping to be able to get corn and soybeans planted but may have to fall back on Prevented Planting. Producers are reminded to report spring seeded forage crops or small grains to their FSA offices before the June 15th deadline. Adams County had 1.5 inches Friday night and another 1.5 inches on Saturday and 0.5" on Sunday around York Springs. Other areas had rain also but not sure accumulations. We are really wet and no planting will be done this week for corn and soybeans and probably no hay/forages cut due to wet field conditions. Hay fields are lying flat from heavy rains/wind over the weekend.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN County, Thomas Kerr

Too wet for any field work this week. No damaging storms, but lots of fog and drizzle

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Some field work continued during the week. Cloudy conditions prevented dry hay making. 3/4 inches of rainfall for the week.

DAUPHIN/PERRY Counties, Liz Bosak

Despite weather forecasts with chances of rain nearly every day, corn and soybean planting continued. Cereal leaf beetle larvae have reached the later larval stages and have begun to pupate. Small grains may be heavily damaged by cereal leaf beetle. Hopefully, farmers were able to get out and apply fungicides if their wheat was flowering. Common lambsquarters, pigweed, common ragweed, and crabgrasses are continuing to germinate. Slug populations in monitored fields have remained low.

INDIANA County, J. Scott Overdorff

Well last week was productive inspite of over 0.60" of rain. The sun came out and dried up the ground good enough to get back into the fields. And it was warm and windy too, which helped to dry thing up. The first corn is looking good, up around 4"-5" now. The oats came up in 5 days after being planted. Have about 2 acres left to plant. Hope not too late to do it, have a little bit of corn to plant yet and a lot of soybeans to do. Have not even thought about mowing any hay yet. When the corn and soybeans are all planted then we will try to get some hay mowed down. Hope everyone has a safe farming week.

JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

A poor week for making dry roughage. Rain and overcast skies created the problem. Corn stands are beginning to show problems in the heavy soils and low lying areas. Replanting will need to be considered. Activities for the week are limited to chopping forage, spreading manure and spraying.

LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Wet conditions still persist, but many farms have started first hay cutting and are working feverishly to get all their corn planted. Apple and Peach crops are looking toward a bumper crop if conditions hold.

MERCER County, James P. Rust

Late last week we received 4.5 inches of rainfall. Many planted fields have gullies and soil erosion and road ditches containing topsoil. Hay harvesting of dry baled hay has not been productive at all.
