Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather Sept. 2nd, 2018:

Pennsylvania had a good week for field activities with an average of 5.0 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 98° (F), a low of 37° (F) and a state average temperature of 75° (F). Flash flooding occurred in areas of Southeast PA, particularly in Hellam Township (York County), resulting in extensive damage to bridges and roadways. Other areas spared by rain experienced warm temperatures allowing ample opportunity for fieldwork but high humidity prevented wet fields from drying and limited opportunities for hay cutting. White mold threatens soybeans and downy mildew has been spotted on cucumbers and pumpkins. Apples and peaches maintained average yield and quality despite a wet season. Field work focused on hay and silage cutting in addition to preparing equipment for fall harvests.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started the week off 68 and foggy but then sun burned through and by lunchtime 90. Tuesday was 69 foggy and then sun into low 90s and humid. Wednesday was 73 morning sun and humid 93. Thursday was 71 morning and sunny and humid 92. Today started out at 71 and cloudy. Forecast calling for some rain but will see if we get any. Corn and soybeans continue to mature. Still has a ways to go before harvest and hopefully no early frost. There is still some pretty poor stands of corn around the county and also some double cropped soybeans are also pretty behind yet in growth. Some of the early planted corn is starting to show signs of drying down. Hay has been made this week with the sunshine and temperatures better conditions for hay making. Still some areas of hay fields that are too wet and marks made in fields from equipment. Some land was prepared for fall seedings but not too much. Peaches and apples continue to be harvested around the county. Quality of the fruit is off due to the rains this summer and yields are being reported as normal. Concerns are how the fruit is going to hold up over time due to weather conditions we had this growing season. Vegetables continue to be harvested and sold at farmers markets or producers roadside stands throughout the county. Timing is the key this year for when crops were planted and what stage they were when we received all the rain. Overall the producers are busy doing various field work around the county and readying their equipment for fall harvest and fall seedings. All producers hoping the early frost is not real close yet since everything is so green now.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN County, Thomas Kerr

Corn silage harvest and haylage were primary field work. Some areas got rain mid-week while a few remained dry. Peach harvest is now past the prime but yields and quality were average.

CAMERON/ELK/MCKEAN/POTTER Counties, Nicole S. Carutis

Still very hard to make dry hay. Soybeans have some disease nothing serious. Potato crop starting to be harvested no idea on yield yet. Corn silage will begin soon.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Some field work completed in the beginning of the week. Showers occupied most of the last portion of the week. Total rainfall 2.5 inches.

CENTRE County, Adriana Murillo-Williams

Some areas received 0.5 of rain this week. Corn ears are denting (R5) and the most advanced soybeans are at R5-R6. White mold is more evident in soybean fields.

COLUMBIA County, John O Yocum

Received some light to moderate rain, but nothing like Southeast PA got.

COLUMBIA/LUZERNE/MONTOUR, C. John Esslinger

Downy mildew which has been present in cucumbers for several weeks has now moved into Northeastern Pennsylvania pumpkins. This week's sunshine was sorely needed to help dry out soggy fields.

JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

Not much to report. Heavy rainfall limited the field activities. At the beginning of the week, dry hay was made, corn is looking good as well as the soybeans. Soybeans are tall and could be subject to lodging.
