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Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather Oct 15th, 2018:

Pennsylvania had a fair week for field activities with an average of 3.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 89° (F), a low of 27° (F) and a state average temperature of 63° (F). Cool weather and occasional rain allowed for fieldwork but did little to help fields dry. Little to no progress was made with hay due to lack of sunshine. Grain corn has been slow to dry and yields have been lackluster. Soybeans continue to suffer from disease and mold with very little progress made in terms of harvesting. Apple harvests continue as do concerns regarding shelf-life due to the high moisture content caused by wet weather. Field activities were limited by rain but consisted of cutting corn for grain and silage and planting fall crops.

REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started the week out sunny and 80's and humid. Tuesday was 71 morning and cloudy but got into the 80's. Wednesday was 71 morning sunny and into the 80's. Thursday 73 morning and most places got an inch of rainfall. Friday was 60's and cloudy. Saturday morning was mid 40's and daytime was low 50's and windy with some rain morning hours. Sunday started 42 degrees and 48 daytime and some showers to dampen things and cloudy. Corn and soybeans continue to mature and be harvested as field conditions permit. Still a lot of green corn and soybeans around the county and producers hoping that they have some more time before frost occurs. Some grain sorghum also is pretty green to be harvested when dryer. Not much small grains has been planted as harvest has been slow due to rainy weather and wet field conditions. Doesn't look like a lot will get planted before end of October. No hay was made as not enough sunshine. Apple harvest continues however quality issues due to this summer/fall wet weather conditions and issues with how apples will be when stored as they are breaking down already. This isn't good as fresh market apples are paid how they pack out so anything that isn't marketable doesn't compensated for. Producers are trying to get done what they can when weather permits. They are trying to beat the frost that will soon be coming.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN County, Thomas Kerr

Corn harvest for grain under way, but yields not exceptional and moisture still high. With silage done and silos filled with hay and silage, lots of high moisture grain is being bagged or fields are being left to dry down naturally. Soybean harvest is expected to start soon. Producers are concerned that their apples will not store well due to wet weather. Harvest about 75% done.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Continued showers made field work difficult during the week. 1 inch of rainfall for the week.

COLUMBIA County, John O Yocum

Received heavy rain on Thursday. Wet fields hamper harvest and other field work.

DAUPHIN/PERRY County, Liz Bozak

Heavy rainfall later this week stalled most field activities across Dauphin and Perry counties. Soybean sprouting and disease issues can be severe in some fields. Early planted soybeans seem to be most affected. Corn sprouting in the ear and ear rots are also a concern. Some winter wheat fields have been planted including fields with standing poor quality soybeans.

JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

Another week of significant rainfall that limited the field activities. At the beginning of the week, there was chopping corn silage, seeding winter grain and a small amount of corn harvest.

LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Continued wet weather has plagued the area. Dry hay making is likely over for the season, with many farms still hoping to make silage and green bales if conditions allow. Most farms are turning attention to corn, hoping for a break in the weather to harvest corn silage and plant fall cover crops. With potential frosts in the forecast, corn will dry down rapidly over the next week.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

The weather continues to keep many farmers out of the fields. Very few soybeans were harvested last week and many that were had significant amounts of moldy beans and/or purple seed staining. Corn yields and quality seem to be better, but slow drydown and poor weather mean that a lot of corn is still standing. Farmers are behind on planting wheat, barley and cover crops.

MERCER County, James P. Rust

Another 1.9 inches of rainfall this past week. Soybean harvesting at a standstill. Few combines working in corn fields. We put all of our hay machines in storage
