Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather Oct 22nd, 2018:

Pennsylvania had a good week for field activities with an average of 4.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 71° (F), a low of 24° (F) and a state average temperature of 46° (F). Less rain this week, but continued cool temperatures did little to dry wet fields. Corn silage harvests have just about reached an end. Grain corn seems to have fared well despite the moist conditions whereas soybeans have struggled with mold growth and discoloration. Apple harvests are nearing completion but quality issues continue to raise concerns over storage shelf life. Pumpkins have suffered from wet conditions resulting in poor quality and size or, in many cases, severe rot. Field activities included harvesting grain corn and soybeans, cutting corn silage and planting winter grains.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started with a rainy Monday in the 50's. About half an inch of rain received. Tuesday was 50's clouds and sun. Wednesday morning started 42 and sunny but very windy into the low 50's. Thursday started 39 degrees and sunny with some wind and into the mid 50's. Friday morning we started with pretty good frost with 32 degrees and sun. Suppose to get into the higher 50's today but over weekend to be colder and especially Sunday. Corn and soybeans for grain continue to be harvested. Some corn silage also chopped this week. Producers trying to get as much harvested where they can with field conditions still a factor. Quality of soybeans is not too good with some reports of them having mold issues and also some mushy. Still a lot of green corn and soybeans around the county which the frost will have affected. Considering the growing year weather conditions decent yields are being reported so far. Some producers are still planning on making some additional hay if they can get a string of nice weather days and field conditions permit also. Some cover crops have been seeded after soybeans and corn harvested and also some barley and wheat has been seeded but planting has been slow due to slow harvest this fall. Apple harvest continues with quality issues due to growing season weather conditions and producers and packing houses/processors are concerned with how the apples are going to keep in storage. Producers also trying to get apples harvested to the loading areas as the rains this fall have not been good for field conditions to move through orchards. Some vegetables are still being harvested around the county but will be coming to an end with the frost. Overall the producers are still busy with plenty of things to do around their farming operations and are anxious to get this year over since it's been challenging for all producers regardless of what crops they grow.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN County, Thomas Kerr

Corn harvest for grain this week in all areas looking good. Some mold and wet corn yet, but not Signiant. Soybeans are about normal yield on full season beans. Apples beginning to come to an end. Still problems with storability and color on fresh crop varieties. Pumpkin for jack-o-lantern were affected by the rain. Poor quality and size.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

A few dry days allowed some harvesting of corn and soybeans.

CENTRE County, Adriana Murillo-Williams

Centre Co has received about 0.45 inches of rain this week; however, soils remain wet. Pre-harvest sprouting has been observed in both corn and soybeans, as well as corn ear rots (mainly Gibberella) in areas that were more affected by heavy rains.

COLUMBIA/LUZERNE/MONTOUR Counties, C. John Esslinger

Problems with moldy and discolored corn and soybeans

DAUPHIN/PERRY County, Liz Bozak

Despite weather challenges, harvest is moving forward for soybeans and corn. Soybean quality is a concern in many fields due to sprouting and other disease issues. Winter annual weeds are germinating.

JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

Harvesting of corn and soybeans is in full swing wherever the soil conditions permit, with the yields being respectable; however, the quality could be better. The main activities for the week were harvesting corn, soybeans, and corn silage, making high moisture forage, planting winter grains.

LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Despite saturated ground conditions, farmers are scrambling to take in corn silage and begin early corn grain harvest.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Finally a near normal fall week! Corn, beans and last cutting of alfalfa coming off. Barley, Wheat, Rye and some late cover crop mixes being seeded. Another week like this and we will be catching up to a typical year.

MERCER County, James P. Rust

Another rainy week and no area soybeans being harvested. Talked to a neighbor last week and he has 700 acres yet to harvest and last year he was done Oct. 20th.
