#### Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather - April 15th, 2018:

Pennsylvania had a good week for field activities with an average of 4 day suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 88° (F), a low of 10° (F) and a state average temperature of 46° (F). Week started off cooler and some snow/rain mixture; no accumulation and most of the week's mornings were 30's and into the 40's. Most days were windier and helped to dry off some fields. Warm eighty degree days on Friday and Saturday dried out fields and field activities picked up. Grasses for hay and pasture were seeded. Winter annual weed growth continued and dandelions were in bud or blooming. A cold front with gusty winds and inches of rain have brought a temporary halt to the growing season. First time this year we have been able to get into the fields to do anything. Some manure hauling, alfalfa and grass seeding, fertilizer and lime spreading. Fruit crops are coming along. Tart Cherries and Apricots, Plums will be pushing here with this warm weather but not blooming yet. Hopefully the temperatures do not get too cold after they start blooming. For now the producers are stating they are pretty tight at the beginning of the week. Overall the producers are readying equipment for this next growing/planting season.

#### ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County's weather started week cooler and some snow/rain mixture no accumulation and most of the week mornings were 30's and into the 40's. Most days were windier and helped to dry off some fields. Thursday however temperatures got into the low 70's and this morning started high 50's and to get into 80's today and tomorrow. Some sun later afternoon on Thursday. Today cloudy morning. Sunday is to be cooler again. We had 80's on Saturday and then Sunday was in the 40's and cloudy, rainy. Sunday into Monday morning we had 2.5 inches of heavy rainfall. Some flooding and lot's of runoff due to soil being saturated. Fieldwork is starting to happen again after winds this week dried fields some to allow fertilizer and manure to be spread. The next few days will help with higher temperatures to dry more fields to allow fieldwork. The small grains and cover crops are greening up and starting to grow height wise and looking ok for now. Not much oats seeded in the county due to the conditions of soil. Fruit crops are coming along. Tart Cherries and Apricots, Plums will be pushing here with this warm weather but not blooming yet. Hopefully the temperatures do not get too cold after they start blooming. For now the producers are stating they are pretty tight at the beginning of the week. #### **CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker**
