Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather – April 22nd, 2018:

Pennsylvania had a poor week for field activities with an average of 2.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were reported with a high of 84° (F), a low of 18° (F) and a state average temperature of 40° (F). Another unseasonably cold week slowly conceded to a warm and sunny weekend but not before a continuation of cold rains and light snow hampered crop growth and field work. Apple progress remains mostly stagnant as a result of the cold but is expected to make rapid progress once warmer weather arrives. Peaches demonstrated such a burst as can be seen in the progress made since last week in the "Green Tip" and "Pink" stages. Previously seeded grasses for hay and pasture have begun showing signs of growth. The onset of warmer weather towards the end of the week did provide opportunity for field work activity which included continued spraying, manure spreading and the start of some sweet corn plantings.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started the week off with 2-3 inches of rainfall around the county and cloudy. Tuesday morning 33 degrees cloudy and windy high 40's. Wednesday started at 31 sunny and some clouds into high 40's. Thursday started 43 some sun and clouds higher 40's. Friday frosty 31 morning and windy during the day into the high 40's. Saturday again was frosty 31 and sunny into the low 60's. Sunday was 43 morning and sunny and 66 degrees. Field conditions still were pretty wet till Friday-Sunday were a little better but still moisture laving in spots in fields. No tillage completed. No corn or soybeans have been planted yet. Some earlier seeded new hay is coming along and existing hay is starting to grow now. Small grains look ok as of now and some topdressing occurred late week but still not known how crop will turn out. We need warmer temperatures and some dry days to get soil temperature improved. Plums are full bloom and possible apple scab since in green tip stage. So far the cherries, peaches and apples are still closed but if we start getting warm temperatures will start the process. Colder morning temperatures late week was concern for the fruit crops. Spraying has started for this year's fruit crops. Overall the producers are trying to get what they can done in the fields as weather and field conditions permit. They are also readying their equipment so when the weather breaks they are ready to roll into the fields to do fieldwork.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN County, Thomas Kerr

Warmer days and sunshine is pushing fruit bloom. Apricot and plum are near full bloom and early peaches are in pink. Blossoms are still tight enough that frost or light freeze this weekend will not be any threat. Some corn will likely be planted this week.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Cool damp weather is slowing field work.. Some Manure hauling, plowing and spraying occurred during the week. Early week rains resulted in 2 3/4 inch in the gage. Soil temps in low 40's

COLUMBIA County, John O. Yocum

Week had snow, rain and one day of 80 degree temperature, and a lot of mornings with frost.

DAUPHIN/PERRY County, Liz Bosak

Cool, wet weather again this week. Over 1.5 inches of rain fell over Dauphin and Perry counties. No diseases observed on small grains this week.

JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

Rainfall in the range of 2 and one half to three and one half inches of rain at the beginning of the week kept people out the field. The soil is well saturated. Very few field activities except for some topdressing and spraying.

WESMORELAND County, Thomas Sierzega

Finally some breaking weather improvements toward end of week. Some field work able to be started. Some sweetcorn started to be planted under plastic. Manure being spread. Fields still too wet and cold for much progress.
