Pennsylvania Weekly Crop Weather July 1, 2019: Pennsylvania had a good week for field activities with an average of 5.5 days suitable for field work. State temperatures last week were reported with a low of 50°F, a high of 92°F, and an average temperature of 72°F. Hot and sunny weather encouraged fieldwork and steady growth from crops that needed catching up. Warmth and sunshine allowed many corn and soybean fields to catch up after past weeks of poor field conditions. Dry weather created favorable conditions for hay making, with some farmers already on their second cut. Barley harvesting has been finishing up and wheat harvest has just begun. Apples and peaches continue to grow. Field activities included manure spreading, spraying, hay cutting, corn and soybean planting, and barley harvesting.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County had a week of sunny weather. That has not been the case for a long time. Morning temperature on Monday and Tuesday was 60 but the rest of the day was into the 70's. Wednesday morning 65 and into the 80's. Thursday and today started 70's and into the 90's and more humid. Corn and soybeans that are planted are continuing to grow. Soybeans are still being planted after hay and small grains have been harvested. Lot's of hay baled this week. Producers were a little hesitant if there was going to be any rain or not if they moved so just moved and got going on it. Yields seem to be pretty good. Some quality issues since a little later due to rains earlier. Barley is being harvested and wheat harvest has started now and will be even more harvested next week. Apples and peaches are continuing to grow. Earlier diseases etc from rains but will not know how the actual crop will fair until harvest. A long time till harvest and many factors can be till then. Vegetables are also maturing and available at farm markets on the farm and local farmers markets. Overall the producers are putting in long days trying to get their work in their fields done and hoping for good crops. Producers are reminded to visit their FSA offices to report their 2019 crops timely before July 15th.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN Counties, Thomas Kerr

Typical summer weather this week. Spotty showers with hot days and nights. Barley harvest finishing. Corn and beans look god and finally getting weeds under control. Wheat is getting ready. Tart cherry harvest underway but have not heard how quality or yields are at this time.

BRADFORD County, Casey Guindon

A stretch of mostly dry weather over the past week has allowed for an abundance of field work. Most first cutting is completed, with some second cutting started this week. Manure spreading continued through this week. Corn and soybean planting is wrapping up.

CENTRE County, Adriana Murillo-Williams

Weather conditions have been optimal for field activities, with scatter showers and a total precipitation of 0.3 inches. Corn ranges from V3-V6, and soybeans from V1-V5 with some fields reaching R1. Insects observed in soybeans fields include bean leaf beetles, aphids, cucumber beetle, thrips, and silver spotted skippers.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Good week for field work. Lot of hay made during the week. Crops look good overall. 3/4 inch of rainfall.

COLUMBIA County, John O Yocum

Hot weather spurred corn growth. Corn height from 12" to 60".

JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William C. Sheaffer

The heat and sunshine was a shot in the arm for the corn and soybeans The early corn that has not been stressed by the heavy rainfall is looking very good. Barley harvest is complete and the wheat harvest is about to begin with the crop looking good. Main activities for the week were planting and harvesting.

LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

A dry stretch was a welcome sign for farmers behind on their field work. Corn planting has finally wrapped up and first cutting is nearing completion on most farms.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Most areas of the county missed significant rainfall last week and are drying out. A shower later in the week after the wheat harvest is finished would be welcome. Warmth and sunshine have help many corn and soybean fields to do some catching up. Sidedress and herbicide applications are still in full swing with crops looking quite except for low lying fields which had areas of standing water. Tobacco and hemp plantings are finished with both crops looking very good. Not seeing any disease pressure to speak of at this time.
