#### General

According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in South Carolina, there were 5.5 days suitable for fieldwork for the week ending Sunday, August 20, 2017. Precipitation estimates for the state ranged from no rain up to 1.3 inches. Average high temperatures ranged from the high 90s to the low 90s. Average low temperatures ranged from the high 70s to the low 70s.

#### **County Comments**

High heat and limited rainfall have dropped soil moisture conditions. Corn harvest beginning at a strong pace.

#### **Charles Davis, Calhoun County**

Corn harvest has begun while experiencing dryer conditions than previous weeks. Extreme heat is drying out soil at a quick rate.

### Matthew Wannamaker, Lexington County

Weather conditions of the past few weeks have farmers behind on harvesting corn and getting fall vegetables planted. Good operating conditions have allowed farmers to harvest corn and prepare land for fall vegetable planting. Some small farmers have reported to have some of the fall greens transplanted.

#### Mark Nettles, Orangeburg County

A week of sweltering temperatures and only a few scattered showers allowed rapid progress in corn harvesting. Most growers are reporting strong yields for both dryland and irrigated corn. Soybean growers are having to apply insecticides for a variety of worms. No disease problems reported in peanuts but growers are maintaining a strict fungicide application schedule. Cotton is beginning to open at a faster rate. The high temperatures of the week with little to no showers have removed any surplus soil moisture but no dryness reported in crops.




