General

According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in South Carolina, there were 6.2 days suitable for fieldwork for the week ending Sunday, June 5, 2022. Precipitation ranged from no rain to 2.3 inches of rain. Average high temperatures ranged from the mid 70s to the high 90s. Average low temperatures ranged from the low 60s to the mid 70s.

Crops

Sporadic rainfall and scattered showers helped provide some relief to dry fields throughout the state. Producers continued to run irrigation for their crops as needed. Some early fungicides were being applied to peanuts. Many producers completed or were finishing up planting peanuts and cotton with some cotton beginning to square. Producers noted that most early planted corn had begun silking. Most hav producers were completed or finishing up their first cutting of hay while winter wheat harvest progressed nicely. Soybean planting progress increased considerably last week, with many producers taking advantage of more favorable soil conditions. Peach harvest continued to progress at a good pace.

Livestock and Pastures

Cattle and pasture and range conditions remained in mostly fair to good condition.




Average Temperature (°F) May 30, 2022 to June 05, 2022
